Accent on Worship

Last week my twin sister and I organized a small group of women who were going to focus on mindfulness and movement for two weeks. Mindfulness because every day, and more so in this typically more full season, we kept feeling like our minds would race away, spinning like tops as they wobbled around daily tasks and work and the addition of holiday demands. The movement piece was to balance out how much extra we ask of our body during this time as well. The winter is setting in, the meals are heartier, the cookies trays are out ... you know how it is. Our small group had a range of ages, lifestyles, and circumstances that have

made it an interesting study in how creating and giving ourselves time to care for ourselves can be a difficult challenge with beautiful benefits.

Mindfulness is the basic human ability to be fully present, aware of where we are and what we're doing, and not overly reactive or overwhelmed by what's going on around us. Think about it with me. Consider when is the last time you sat in a peaceful silence just paying attention to the present moment, unattached to any particular thought or worry or task or feeling? How often do you find means to fill mental space with distractions or noise? When having a conversation, does your mind wander away to other things you have to do? As modern humans, we have become conditioned to overstimulation as if it is the necessary pace we function from, filling our lives and schedules with "meaning," but rarely paying close attention to the actual living of life that is happening in the in between. Retraining the mind to stay present allows us to fully engage in the beautiful gift of the present moment.

Practices of gratitude, deep breathing, meditation, and prayerful contemplation are age-old revolutions from the modern societal norms that push and pull us while leaving us unfulfilled. As we walk through this Advent season of waiting and patience, I invite you to practice some intentional mindfulness or to expand what you've been practicing and try something new. Storytelling for Survivors: Exile, Empire, and the Shape of Scripture

The current Thursday Bible study series of this year continues through Dec. 21, meeting in the Chapel Lounge from 6:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Vicar Christy is leading this exploration of texts related to the Babylonian Exile (597-539 B.C.E.), with an emphasis on understanding the writers as survivors making sense of crises. How did the experience of conquest and displacement shape how the ancient faith community told its story, and how do the questions they asked about God still live with us today? Over the five weeks, we will read selections from Kings, various prophets, the Psalms, Ezra-Nehemiah, and Esther.

We begin at 6 pm with a light supper. All are welcome.



While we're waiting, Property Committee is installing new entry operators on the upstairs restrooms, to make these rooms ADA compliant, an appropriate addition to the purpose of the new front entry. We should be finished with installing these by Christmas.
