Accent on Worship *Vicar Jessica Christy*

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say – Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour."

Scholars sometimes talk about Jesus approaching his crucifixion with greater confidence in the Gospel of John than in the other Gospels. By John's telling, Christ doesn't grieve in the garden, doesn't cry out in despair on the Cross. But here, we get to see a rare flash of his fear. Jesus has entered just entered Jerusalem and is explaining his coming death to a curious crowd. He tells them that his death will be fruitful, like a grain of wheat that enters the earth so that it can bear fruit. He tells them that he will be raised, and so will bring all people together in new life. In the next moment, he demonstrates that he can

call on his Father's voice at any time. And yet he is troubled. For all the composure that he will show in the face of death, he knows what's coming, and he knows it won't be easy. He even ponders the possibility that he could ask the Father to find a different way, then rejects the idea; this is why he has come, and this is what he must do. He needs to be lifted up on the Cross before he can be lifted from the grave, and so lift all things with him.

I love Jesus' very human instinct when he imagines praying to be spared the coming ordeal. It's what we pray every week: "save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil." And yet we constantly find ourselves in situations of uncertainty, pain, and death. Suffering is not a good thing, and we should never wish to be hurt, or to see each other hurting – but sometimes we are called to face an hour of trouble, even when it would be easier to run away. Sometimes we need to follow the way of Christ and enter into his sacrificial love in order to sow seeds of new life. This can be a scary call, and like Jesus, we're allowed to be scared. But as Jesus promises, wherever we go, he will be with us, drawing us to him and raising us to eternal life.

Very frequently in my conversations with neighbors, they express something specific that they need that would be helpful in their lives. Knowing that we are all connected, I'll be putting those needs here and on the kiosk to see if anyone can help with these needs. Because I'd like to avoid becoming a full donation center, please try to respond to the specific items on the list or check with me before bringing in items not on the list. All donated items can be put in my office (ask staff) or marked and put in the bins by the upstairs kitchen. Any gift cards or financial donations can go to the office directly (to Anna's mailbox) or put in the offering in an envelope marked "needs of the neighborhood." Thank you. Gracias. Mahadsanid.

Baby items: There is a mother who is due with her 3rd child - a daughter - soon and needs help with baby items. They are currently homeless and working towards housing. Or if anyone is able to watch two children ages 2 and 5 when the baby arrives she would sure be grateful!

For baby & mom: Simple clothing items (girl), bottles & drying rack (any size), baby hygiene (diaper cream, shampoo, lotion, brush), swaddles and blankets, snack and a water bottle for mom, dish soap & laundry detergent, gift cards for other needs (Target, Cub, Walmart).

“Wise Fools: Wisdom on the Folly of War”

Every year, since 2003, World Storytelling Day events take place on or around March 20 in more than 25 countries. Storytelling is often thought of as fairytales, fables, and oral history, but it is also commonly used to foster peace and understanding, community building, healing, and in advocacy work. Each year a global theme complements the principal concept behind WSD, “If I can hear your story, it's harder for me to hate you.” This year’s global theme is “Wise Fools.”

In the evening’s stories, the global theme will be interpreted through the lens of “Wisdom on the Folly of War” and will frequently feature those who speak truth from the heart even in the face of popular opposition.
