## Accent on Worship

On April 3, 1968, Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. gave what would be his final speech on the eve of his assassination the following day. Made 50 years ago and named, "the Mountaintop Speech," it was prophetic, dark, and timeless. He was in Memphis in response to a strike by sanitation workers who were fighting for recognition of a union for better wages and a safer work environment after two workers were recently crushed in a compactor and the city refused to compensate the families. That night, King proclaimed that he had seen the Promised Land. With an eerie foreshadowing of the future he continued, "I may not get there with you. But I want you to know that tonight, we as a people, will get to the Promised Land."

As I was listening to a news review of his speech, I was struck by relevance and with the Easter story and the current state we continue in as a country and its people. Instead of my words, I'd like us to ponder his, made 50 years ago in Memphis. To read more or hear his entire speech visit the Washington Posts's Daily 202: MLK's final speech.

[If God let him choose any era to live in, King told the crowd he'd pick the second half of the 20th century. "That's a strange statement," King said. "The world is all messed up. The nation is sick. Trouble is in the land. ... But I know, somehow, that only when it is dark enough can you see the stars."]

["You may not be on strike, but either we go up together or we go down together. Let us develop a kind of dangerous unselfishness," King said. "Whenever Pharaoh wanted to prolong the period of slavery in Egypt, he had a favorite formula for doing it. ... He kept the slaves fighting among themselves. But whenever the slaves get together, something happens in Pharaoh's court, and he cannot hold the slaves in slavery. When the slaves get together, that's the beginning of getting out of slavery."]

And finally, finding the parallel between the Good Samaritan and the need for unity, King states, "the question should not 'if I stop to help this man in need what will happen to me, but the question is if I do not stop to help the sanitation worker, what will happen to him?'"

## Mount Olive Lutheran Church 2017 Year End Giving Report

Mount Olive's members and friends displayed truly exceptional generosity during 2017. Your monetary gifts enable the church's important work to benefit our congregation, its neighborhood, the Twin Cities, and the world beyond. Thank you for helping to make this a reality.

We thought it would be helpful for members to know how various church sectors benefited from your generosity and helped others.

### Operational (General) Giving

These are the gifts support the regular ministry of the church. The operational budget includes staff salaries, building maintenance, utilities, and program and ministry budgets.

- This past year, our community gave Mount Olive gifts of \$721,231 to support these operational needs.
- This included our annual 12% tithe (over \$80,000) that was used to support global missions, local neighborhood ministries, and the Minneapolis Synod.

### Designated Giving

These gifts support specific projects, ministries, or missions. Unlike operational giving, these funds are used for the purpose specified by the giver. If you have a specific ministry in mind you want to support, you can designate those funds by indicating that ministry/mission in the memo line of your check.

- Bold Step Forward was by far the largest account that received restricted giving funds in 2017 with more than \$750,000 in gifts.
- There was an additional \$24,984 that was designated and given – in excess of out 12% tithe – that supported various ministries, missions, and programs.

### Mount Olive Foundation

- In August 2017, the Foundation made a 12-year, interest-free loan of \$71,845 to the Church which allowed it to complete its solar project and obtain a state grant.
- The Foundation pledged \$60,000 to the "A Bold Step Forward" campaign, payable over three years.
- Gifts to the Mount Olive Foundation in 2017 totaled \$187,847.44 thanks in large part to two bequests totaling \$150,000.
- The Foundation's endowment also increased by \$130,511.49 due to investment appreciation.
- The Foundation's annual gift to the Church, presented on April 23, 2017, was \$40,057.90 – double the amount given five years ago and another record. The Vestry chose to use these funds to address 18 separate needs.
- Including the Church's loan repayment commitment, the Foundation's assets totaled \$1,544,048.86 as of December 31, 2017.
- To date, 39 households have included the Mount Olive Foundation in their estate plans.
