## Accent on Worship *Vicar Jessica Christy*

A broiled piece of fish. That's how the disciples finally understand the resurrection.

When Jesus first appears among them in Luke's Gospel, they think they're seeing a ghost. It's almost a comical moment – Christ has conquered the grave, but they're convinced he's a spook. He's on Easter, they're seeing Halloween.

But Jesus doesn't chide their confusion and unbelief. Instead, he tells them to see and touch his risen body. People across the centuries have chided Thomas in the Gospel of John for demanding to touch Jesus, but according to Luke, Jesus invites his disciples' inquisitive hands: "Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." But still they don't understand, so he snacks on some fish in front of them, to prove that he is truly risen. After all, ghosts can't eat.

That fish says everything. The risen Christ is a flesh-and-blood human being. His body is physical, still dependent on food to live. He can chew, swallow, and metabolize a meal into the energy he needs to stand among them. He is no vision, no metaphor or memory, no ghost. His body has truly reversed the irreversible process of death and decay and walked out of the tomb. No promise or teaching could convince the disciples this is true; they need to see it in the meal for they can accept its shocking reality. But Jesus gives them the proof they need, and then they believe.

The resurrection is not some complex theological proposition. It's not a literary metaphor. It's not a distant promise that's waiting to be fulfilled. The resurrection is a concrete fact of life, as tangible as a piece of fish sitting on your dinner table.
