Ruth 3:1-5; 4:13-17 Psalm 127 Hebrews 9:24-28 Mark 12:38-44 When I was growing up I would often have elaborate, fantastical dreams. Each morning I'd wake and say to my twin sister, "guess what I dreamt last night!" But not every evening was a fairy tale. Many nights I lay awake traumatized by fears of the reality that seems inevitable: war, violence, anger, hatred that drives humans, whom I believe to be essentially good, in to a frightful, spiritless state of unfathomable evil. In my bed at night, my refuge was the Lord's Prayer. When scary thoughts needled their way in, I would fervently recite the familiar lines until sleep washed over me. "Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name..."

Now, as an adult, a wife, and a mother, I am living and watching the world turn in a fearsome tailspin that keeps me up at night. All of history tells a story that I cannot ignore. News of the future of this planet, the state of affairs, the violent acts of people who cannot or will not see beyond their personhood in to a shared humanity make my heart ache with fear and trembling. I do not wish to feel so unnerved. I do not share this with you so you can be concerned for me, but to acknowledge that it is reasonable and okay to feel overwhelmed and scared by the world around us. Fear is not to be ignored, but travelled through. As a person who believes strongly

and deeply in the power that each person possesses, the trail of my fear also points to what I love, and when we can all focus on what we love, we can become an incredibly powerful force driving towards what is good.

My tiny prayers in the night are not moving mountains of darkness, but they do wrap me in a cloak of light. I often think of what was happening in the time that the Lord's Prayer was written. How uncertainty and difficulty have never heeded in the story of humankind, but neither has faith and hope and love. In small and beautiful ways we can continually offer one another peace within the trials, and light through the darkness.

Assalaam alaykum. Namaste. Shalom. Peace be with you.

Wall of Forgotten Natives - An Update

Mount Olive has recently made three trips to the homeless encampment on Franklin and Hiawatha Avenues to serve a midday warm meal. We plan to continue as long as needed. Feeding bodies is an important ministry specialty of this community, but there are other ways to learn more and do more to be loving, informed neighbors to those residing at the Wall. DONATIONS NEEDED:

Winter Wear: boots, gloves, hats, coats, thick socks, long underwear of all sizes (adults and kids) **Blankets**, **sleeping bags**, tarps (extra large), tents, hand warmers, wood, water, one-pound propane tanks. Non-perishable food items (remember people are camping and cooking is difficult).

Large pillar candles, for warmth.

Souls to the Polls

You may have noticed that we have signs outside Mount Olive that say "Souls to the Polls." A member spotted them in and around the area of Augsburg College and inquired with the college about them. They are being distributed by a number of faith groups, including ISAIAH, the Minnesota Council of Churches, the Archdiocese of Minneapolis and St. Paul, and the Black Ministerial Alliance, to encourage people of faith to vote. If you Google "Souls to the Polls," you will find that this effort is nationwide, and appears to be concentrated in neighborhoods of color and other areas where voter turnout has sometimes been suppressed.

Celebrating All Saints Day in the Home

In the Western Church, All Saints Day on November 1, All Souls Day on November 2, and All Saints Sunday (first Sunday in November) are all days to remember those who have gone before us, known and unknown, great pillars of the church, and also family and friends.

Originally celebrated in the church in the month of May, the celebration of the blessed dead on All Saints was moved to November 1 by Pope Gregory III (ca. 731-741).

There are many ways to keep this festival in the home, from various traditions:

The French place chrysanthemum wreaths on the graves of loved ones.

In Guatemala, kites are flown, to be a "link" between the worlds of the living and the dead.

In England and Ireland, traditional "soul cakes" were baked - a spiced soft cookie with a cross of currants on top. To hear Peter, Paul and Mary sing about soul cakes, go to:

One could place pictures of departed friends and relatives somewhere in the home with votives in front of them. The following prayer from the funeral liturgy could be said: "Most Holy God, we remember before you today_(name)___. We thank you for giving her/him/them to us to know and love as a companion in our pilgrimage on earth. In your boundless compassion, console us who mourn. Give us faith to see that death has been swallowed up in the victory of our Lord Jesus Christ, so that we may live in confidence and hope, through Jesus Christ, our savior and Lord. Amen."
