Letting Go

We who live in the Northern Hemisphere get an added dimension to the liturgical year we observe. Nature adds an underscore to where we are in the liturgical cycle. Right now, we're in the "end times" - the last days of the lectionary before we start over on Advent 1. The lessons speak of All Saints, the return and Reign of Christ, of harvest, of the darkness, of our yearning for light.

Much of nature lets go of its green growth - deciduous trees let go of the leaves and fruit that do their important work in the growing season, in order to "hunker down" conserving all energy in preserving the root system, covered in dark soil. We know it is not death, even though it may look like it - this process is a dramatic preparation for new life that comes in Spring. I think of it as a great "letting go." The days grow shorter - I'm already noticing that the drive to and from work is in darkness. It's colder.

It's a time for us to shed some of the excess we grew over the long green season, to hunker down to our own roots buried in our souls. To find the energy for that inner core of what we really need.

This Sunday's lesson is the story of the widow's mite. A woman who only had two coins gives all that she had. Much less than the more wealthy folks around her gave. But the percentage . . .

I've always thought of stewardship a bit backwards than what I so often have heard over the years in the church. People are often asked to give to a cause - help with their financial support of someone or something in need. For churches, giving is in order to "support the church and its mission." So if our budget calls for XX number of dollars, that's what we need to raise. There's nothing wrong with that, to be sure! The needs are indeed real and those of us with the financial ability to help are called to do so.

The backwards part is that often the real "need" is more that I *need* to "let go" of money that's been given to me (OK, earned...) perhaps just as much as the recipient's need of it. Do I really need that \$20, even though it's my last? (Forget that I can walk up to a machine and it can spit a battery of 20's at me pretty quickly and easily).

Large pillar candles, for warmth.

Capital Appeal Nears Milestone at the End of November

The work from our Capital Appeal, Bold Step Forward, has been completed, and at the end of November we reach a major milestone: the construction loan will become our mortgage going forward.

Bold Step Forward was conceived as a 3-year fundraising campaign. This means that our fundraising is nearing the halfway point. To date, we have received more than \$750,000 of the \$1.1 million pledged. The balance of the cost of our construction (the new HVAC system which provides air conditioning in the nave, the renewed parking lot, the revisions to the Parish House entrance, and the replacement of sagging organ pipes) will become a 30-year mortgage that has a locked-in favorable rate.

All Bold Step Forward funds received by the end of November will reduce the size of the new mortgage. If you are considering a gift in 2018 toward Bold Step Forward, doing so by the end of November will be very helpful!

Your Bread for the World Advocacy Matters!

Earlier last month, the Global Food Security Reauthorization Act unanimously passed in both the House and Senate. Its passage extends congressional authorization for Feed the Future, a U.S. government initiative charged with combating chronic hunger and food insecurity around the world. Last week the President signed the act.

Through initiatives like Feed the Future, participating countries have been able to increase agricultural and nutritional investments. As a result, farmers can feed their families and communities and contribute to their countries' economic growth.

I wonder if we spend way too much time trying to figure out how much we can give and still have enough left. Enough for what? What are truly our needs? I suspect a lot of us could pretty easily get along with far less than we think. We could let go of far more than we think. It's hard, to be sure. The mortgage is real. And for heaven's sake, listen to me - one who's "livelihood" depends on this approach! And so it goes.

What this month, the close of the liturgical season we began last Advent, can help us understand is that we can let go. God is all that we need - God is the root system that feeds us, and gives us new life when things fall away. The widow shed all of what the world would normally say she needs. But she had something more important that no one could take away.

Let's let go together and see what happens.
