## Accent on Worship *Cantor David Cherwien*

### *Here we go*

I don't know about you, but I'm ready for Lent. There have been some years where it seems we're gathering for Ash Wednesday

the week after taking the Christmas tree down. Not this year. And I'm ready to focus on something other than snow.

This Sunday is one of transitions. Transfiguration Sunday for Lutherans is the last Sunday before Ash Wednesday. Perhaps you are familiar with the story for Transfiguration – Jesus, Peter, John and James went up on “the mountain to pray”. Then Jesus’ appearance changed and his clothes became dazzling white, and an Moses and Elijah appear, talking to him”. It is from here that Jesus and the disciples go to Jerusalem.

There is a lot of mystery to this day's narrative for me. And I suspect there are things in this story we might not recognize. What were Jesus, Moses and Elijah talking about? Why Moses and Elijah? Then there's the matter of the “dwellings” that Peter offered to make for the three. Why the glowing? And then, the voice of God which we heard about at the Baptism of Jesus: “This is my Son, my beloved, listen to him!” There is much to explore in this narrative.

But the day does mark a transition. The Wednesday following (March 6) is Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of Lent.

Then, what can we make of the season of Lent? Many communities of faith make Lent an extended Holy Week. Requiems are performed. It's observed as a “sad” or sullen time. Perhaps that's meaningful for some.

For us Lutherans, it isn't intended to be such. Hopefully, we use this time to re-evaluate what it means to be a baptized child of God. How does being baptized call us to live differently? How does it call us to respond to the world around us – making us counter-cultural? While some may think this is introspective season, perhaps it's more an invitation to review our extro-spection – how do we regard those with which we come into contact? How do we respond to what goes on in our culture outside of these walls? How do we re-evaluate our priorities?

Perhaps it means something like this. In Lent, maybe we learn to adjust our possessions to re-define what we really need. Perhaps 5 outfits instead of 10. Or maybe cleaning our closets and giving away things is an exercise for adjusting our priorities. Could be that it means finding out if we can live on less income, giving more away. Perhaps it means an extra phone call each week to someone who is lonely. Not as much giving something up as adjusting our sense of what is enough, re-defining abundance, or not even being about ourselves as much as increasing our compassion for those around us.

## Implicit Bias Learning at Mount Olive

**Adult Forum on the topic of implicit bias will be presented on Sunday, March 10,** between liturgies. Anne Phibbs, PhD, will be presenter. Dr. Phibbs is Founder and President of Strategic Diversity Initiatives and brings over 25 years' experience helping organizations advance their equity, diversity, and inclusion goals. She will speak on the following premise: "in order to address the myriad ways that certain people are marginalized based on social identities such as race, gender, disability, religion, class, sexual orientation, etc., every one of us needs to understand our own identities, how we all demonstrate bias that is often unconscious, and how we are all capable of moving toward equity."

Then, **on Saturday, March 30, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.,** Restorative Justice Community Action (a group that many Mount Olive people have worked with, and who uses our building for a number of their needs) will lead a **workshop called "Community Conversations,"** All members of the congregation are invited to attend; it will also be advertised through RJCA, so there will likely be some of our neighbors attending as well.

We hope that all members of Mount Olive will consider attending both the forum and the workshop. We always can benefit from deeper learning and listening, and God works through that to bring us to new ways of being Christ together and in the world.

We add services on Wednesdays during Lent. Why? It's hard work re-evaluating our lives like that – these times for prayer provide an island for re-focus in the middle of our time away from Church (so to speak) between Sundays. A way of saying "Oh Yeah – that's I'm all about". Extra prayer, extra proclamation, extra expression through song, getting together with thos in the same journey and challenges with us, there is tremendous strength building in these gatherings. Rather than "forcing" yourself to come, consider how committing to add coming to a midweek service to your Lent journey can be of tremendous help in your re-commitment.

Then at the Easter Vigil, we again say "I renounce them!" and "We will!" – and we are again sprinkled with water – as a way of renewing our baptismal promise and commitment. Ideally, it will be something we've actually been thinking about and working on for five weeks.

Try it all on. I'm ready. Are you?

## EPES (Popular Education for Health) Expands Training

Health workers, church workers, community leaders and advocates from Madagascar, Zimbabwe, Senegal, Ethiopia, Tanzania, Kenya, United States, Nicaragua, Guatemala and Chile participated in the 10th International Training course for education health workers. Global Mission of the ELCA provided key support that made the program possible and sent four of their staff members and five African health workers. In its 10 years, 187 people from 25 countries have participated in the International Training that imparts the principles and techniques of participatory and community strategies for health. The women and men who spent eleven intense days at the school learned how to form community health promotion groups, worked with local organizations to address health issues, explored the role of churches in the struggles for the right to health and reflected about factors that ensure a sustainable future.

## News From the Neighborhood

### *March is Minnesota Food Share Month*

During the week at Mount Olive, we commonly have neighbors coming in to see if we have food. Thanks to many of you, we often do have some pantry items or ready-to-eat options that we can offer to people to tide them over. The grocery cart in the coat room keeps re-filling with food as does the corner of hygiene supplies. This is a small but meaningful way that we can provide needed and appreciated items for those in a hardship situation, but we also recommend our partners at Community Emergency Services to provide the rest.

March is Minnesota Foodshare Month and CES is asking for our support. They want to gather a total of 40,000 pounds of food and raise \$125,000 during March. We can help! Bring food pantry items or hygiene supplies to drop off in our grocery cart and/or give a financial gift to help CES make purchases.

\*Items suggested: Cooking oils, sugar and flour, toilet paper, hygiene products (deodorant, toothbrushes and paste), canned chicken, tuna & chili.

Nearly one in ten Minnesotans experience food insecurity (*US Dept. of Agriculture*) 13.8% of children in Minnesota are food insecure (*Feeding America*). Food security is "access by all people at all times to enough food for an active, healthy lifestyle." Food insecurity means access to adequate food is inconsistent and limited by a lack of money and other resources through the year. Food insecure households report their diets to be of reduced quality, variety, or desirability and/or experience disrupted eating patterns and reduced food intake.
