Many of you reading this may be aware that my ministry background is in administering Christian education and youth ministry programs. Before coming to Mount Olive, I served in these areas at three other congregations. One of these congregations was in Columbia Heights, MN. In that role, I worked with a wonderfully diverse group of young people. We had immigrants from Liberia and Sudan along with young people from north Minneapolis and many of the north suburbs all involved in our youth ministry programs. While I served there, one of our young people committed a pretty serious crime. He was caught and arrested. He was guilty, a fact he admitted. He entered a guilty plea with the court and faced sentencing. As someone who knew this young man well, I was asked to testify on his behalf at the sentencing hearing. Among other things I shared with the court, I stated that this young man needed treatment, not punishment. He was a young man who was good when around others who encouraged him to act in positive ways; he was bad when around those who encouraged negative behavior. He needed guidance and support in building his confidence in who he

was, not punishment for this incident. The judge agreed and sentenced him to detention at a juvenile detention facility that was focused much more on treatment and education than punishment and that was a great thing for this young man. While in detention, he received his high school diploma and was able to obtain some college credits. When he was released, he continued his college studies and worked hard to break with his past.

In many ways, the story of this young man mirrors the story of Onesimus, from this week's epistle reading. Onesimus was a slave. He ran away from his owner, which at the time, was an illegal act, punishable by imprisonment. Somehow, while he himself was imprisoned, Paul has the opportunity to build a relationship with Onesimus, and as Paul says, he became "useful." In fact, the name Onesimus, perhaps in a bit of parental foreshadowing, means "useful." In this letter, Paul pleads for Philemon, Onesimus' owner, to take Onesimus back, "no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother."

## Every Church A Peace Church - Twin Cities

The next regular bimonthly potluck supper meeting will be on Monday, September 16, 6:30 p.m., at St. Joan of Arc Catholic Church, 4537 3rd Ave. S., Minneapolis.

The topic for this program is "The Underlying Cause of the Iranian/US Conflict: Facts and Fictions," presented by Nasrin Jewell, professor emeritus at St. Catherine University. She has taught and written about issues related to women, the world economic order, poverty and unequal distribution of income, transnational corporations, and the Middle East.

Program description: Iran has a well-understood geopolitical and economic importance for the U.S., the Middle East, and the world. Nasrin will discuss the historical reasons behind the mistrust, and the current situation from the point of view of the Iranians, including her own first hand observations from her visits to Iran. She will also discuss how the U.S. government's actions, based on false irrational and dangerous propaganda, are having devastating impacts on Iran.

## An Update and Thanks

Dear family in Christ, thank you so much for your prayers and concern over the past few weeks as news of Mary's cancer diagnosis has spread. We've been letting people know and hoping the news got around, and it has, a little. But some of you aren't on social media (nor am I), and may not have caught on to it in other ways, either. So I thought a brief report might be helpful.

Here it is. Mary has non-Hodgkin lymphoma, the follicular type. It's stage 2, and we're very hopeful for remission. However, it does have a tendency to recur, so this will be a long journey. She started her first of a planned six cycles of chemo - and immunotherapy last Friday. That could be shorter or longer, depending on how the cancer reacts. She did better than expected in dealing with the treatment days, and has had some side-effects, but so far not as bad as they could be. (Says the person who didn't have chemicals sent through his veins!)

Your prayers and support are already happening, and we covet that going forward. Thank you all for your kindness and grace!

## News From the Neighborhood

### *Diaper Depot Help Needed*

We are looking to expand our volunteer corps for the Diaper Depot.

We are one of a very few organizations that provide young families with low-cost diapers for their little ones. As word has spread, we have seen a significant increase in the number of families we serve.

With this increase, the number of diapers we need to process on a weekly basis has increased significantly, and the need for more workers is apparent.

There are two ways you can be of service in the Diaper Depot.

First, we are looking for volunteers to pack diapers. Our current volunteers often pack diapers on Tuesdays during the day, either before or after noon Bible study.

Second, we are looking for more people to work the hours the Diaper Depot is open, 4:00 to 6:00 pm on Tuesdays and on the first and third Saturdays (the same weeks as the Community Meal), 11:00 am to 1:00 pm. Volunteers working the Diaper Depot will help our clients by packing up the needed diapers, checking out their purchases, and registering new clients.

For both roles, training would be provided and volunteer will be put on a rotating schedule with other volunteers. Time commitment is flexible - volunteers could serve once a week or once a month or any amount of time in between.
