Accent on Worship Vicar Bristol Reading

I love that Mount Olive includes in each week's intercessory prayers those who are commemorating their baptismal anniversaries. Martin Luther wrote,

"If, then, the holy sacrament of baptism is a matter so great, gracious, and full of comfort, we should diligently see to it that we ceaselessly, joyfully, and from the heart thank, praise, and honor God for it... The whole world was, and still is, full of baptism and the grace of God." This week actually marks the 34th anniversary of my own baptism – thanks be to God! – so I'm sharing some ways that I remember the gift of my baptism. Maybe these practices will nourish your spirit, too.

• *Making the sign of the cross*

This is one of the simplest and oldest prayers. When I make the sign of the cross, I remind myself that I was baptized in the name of the Triune God, and that I am "sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever," as we say in our baptismal liturgy.

• Wearing an alb

Traditional Christian practice was that baptismal candidates would shed their old clothes before their baptisms and put on neutral, unadorned robes (albs) afterwards to symbolize the new people we become through baptism. Every time I lead worship I put on a baptismal garment, reminding me that we are all beloved children of God, and that we can always be made new again in Christ.

• Declaring my baptismal identity

Luther suggested that when we experience temptation, anxiety, or inadequacy, we can cling to the comforting promise of God's grace and forgiveness by declaring "I am baptized!" It is freeing to know we are irrevocably loved!

Enjoying the water

Baptism reminds us of the sacredness of the created world and our own bodies. Being on (or in!) lakes, streams, or oceans reminds me that God's spirit moves in mysterious and powerful ways, like waves and wind, and that God works through the ordinary things of the world – water, bread, wine, even something as ordinary as me.

Diaper Depot Help Needed

We are looking to expand our volunteer corps for the Diaper Depot.

We are one of a very few organizations that provide young families with low-cost diapers for their little ones. As word has spread, we have seen a significant increase in the number of families we serve.

With this increase, the number of diapers we need to process on a weekly basis has increased significantly, and the need for more workers is apparent.

There are two ways you can be of service in the Diaper Depot.

First, we are looking for volunteers to pack diapers. Our current volunteers often pack diapers on Tuesdays during the day, either before or after noon Bible study.

Second, we are looking for more people to work the hours the Diaper Depot is open, 4:00 to 6:00 pm on Tuesdays and on the first and third Saturdays (the same weeks as the Community Meal), 11:00 am to 1:00 pm. Volunteers working the Diaper Depot will help our clients by packing up the needed diapers, checking out their purchases, and registering new clients.

For both roles, training would be provided and volunteer will be put on a rotating schedule with other volunteers. Time commitment is flexible - volunteers could serve once a week or once a month or any amount of time in between.
