Accent on Worship Cantor David Cherwien

What happenswhen In November, we have more conversations about death than most times of the year. Indeed, in the northern

hemisphere nature is "dying" around us, we begin the month with All Saints remembrances, and each week the lessons speak of "end" times.

In this Sunday's lesson, Sadducees ask Jesus questions about what happens "in heaven" – specifically with marital issues when someone has been married more than once. "Who's the spouse in heaven?" While it may seem like a silly line of inquiry, I suspect we all have similar kinds of questions about what happens when we die. One of our saints, Elmer Jaster, when close to death said, "Let's see what this is all about" with a fearless sense of curiosity, yet trust.

Questions like - Where is heaven? What is heaven? What exactly happens at the point of death? Is there a physical resurrection of the body? What will we "look like? Do we "sleep" until a particular point? Will we "see" people we knew there?

We've learned a lot of language and phrases that attempt to give words for what we don't know, like "fell asleep in the Lord." But that's precisely the thing I'm intrigued by: we really DON'T know exactly. It's mystery. We say we have "the hope" that we will be awakened by Jesus. We say we live in "the promise" of the Resurrection – of life that never ends – just moves to a different form without the body and its frailty.

For me right now, I think an aspect of the Resurrection is teaching us we can live without fear. Fear of death is one of our most basic instincts – mostly related to protection – the "fight or flight" reflex is a powerful part of our brain. But take away fear of dying, and we can learn to live differently. We learn more about what true abundance is, and live compassionate lives. We can live with child-like wonder. We can live with deep gratitude for each breath. We can live for others. We can live without a lust to acquire things that we can't take with us. We can live with knowing our relationships can be savored and enjoyed. We don't have to fear darkness because there's nothing to be afraid of since the basic thing we fear (not living) can't be taken away. God is already with us (as opposed to us "leaving to be with God.") We just don't understand "what that's going to look like" when we leave our physical bodies. *Continued on page* 2

Sunday, November 17, 2019 - 4:00 pm



Now we ring bells again, many bells, many places, 11 times at that sacred moment. With a moment of silence we remember the civilians and soldiers killed in every country and we commit to work and pray for peace until this assault on the Will of the Creator of us all is finally over."

Our Saviour's Housing's New Program

The OSH Transitional Housing Program Manager is going to begin teaching a cooking class for the eight women in the program. Her vision is to teach them how to prepare meals with ingredients that can be found in the food shelf and fit within their budgets. She would love for every woman to also have a basic cooking set to bring to every class which includes:

- 1 8x8 Pyrex casserole baking dish
- 1 set of measuring cups
- 1 set of measuring spoons
- 1 whisk
- 1 spatula
- 1 small/medium cutting board (not wood)
- 1 kitchen knife (for cutting vegetables and meat)
- 1 medium-sized mixing bowl (plastic)
- 1 8-inch non-stick skillet
- 1 tote bag to place their cooking items in when they come to the main office for the class

It would great to have 8 of these cooking sets donated. Can you help? The class will begin when we have enough of these sets.

Elaine Halbardier will prepare a sample kit to showcase what they are looking for. If you are able to provide a whole kit, please do - if only one or two pieces, that is also helpful - workers in the Neighborhood Ministry program will assemble individual pieces into kits for Our Saviour's.
