Accent on Worship Vicar Bristol Reading

Last month I wrote a reflection about the Gospel reading and water. This week's lectionary readings, however, are about mountains.

Exodus 24 tells of Moses' encounter with the glory of the LORD atop Mount Sinai. To the Israelite people watching from the foothills below, it looks like the mountaintop is engulfed in flames. Then Matthew's Gospel presents us with the story of Jesus' mysterious transfiguration at the peak of a high mountain. Jesus' disciples are stunned to see his face and clothes radiate like the sun and to hear the voice of God speak directly from a shining cloud. What is it about mountains that make them such perfect settings for divine revelation? What spiritual lessons can we learn from rocks?

You may be familiar with ecologist Aldo Leopold's idea of "thinking like a mountain." Leopold used this phrase to describe a perspective that is wide enough to understand the holistic interconnectedness of complex ecosystems over time. Mountains, whose lifetimes can stretch millions of years, exist on a different time scale than the creatures and plants around them. As bearers of such ancient wisdom and stories, it's no wonder the scripture writers saw mountains as profoundly mystical places!

It may be a challenge for us mere humans to try to think like mountains, but scientist Marcia Bjornerud encourages us to at least try thinking like geologists. I recently finished her book *Timefulness: How Thinking Like a Geologist Can Help Save the World*, in which she writes about the ways geology can help us "witness time in a way that transcends the limits of our human experiences" (16).

For me, geology points to a middle way between the sins of narcissistic pride in our importance and existential despair at our insignificance. It affirms a teaching attributed to the eighteenth-century Polish Rabbi Simcha Bunim that we should all carry two slips of paper in our pockets: one that says "I am ashes and dust," and one that reads "The world was made for me." The earth itself, with its immensely deep history, is a communal heritage and universal mentor that may help us find a set of shared values. Studying its past may cause us to reconceive ourselves as fellow citizens of a profoundly mysterious planet that we urgently need to know better. (177)

In the rhythms of church time, we're entering Lent, a season in which we emphasize the idea that we are ashes and dust. This means we are finite and mortal, but it also means we are made of earth and we belong to this world with all its wonder. As beloved creations of God, it is important to remember both.

Planning Ahead: March is Minnesota Food Share Month

During the week at Mount Olive, we commonly have neighbors coming in to see if we have food. Thanks to many of you, we often do have some pantry items or ready-to-eat options that we can offer to people to tide them over. The grocery cart in the coat room keeps re-filling with food as does the corner of hygiene supplies. This is a small but meaningful way that we can provide needed and appreciated items for those in a hardship situation, but we also recommend our partners at Community Emergency Services to provide the rest.

March is Minnesota Foodshare Month and CES is asking for our support. They want to gather a total of 40,000 pounds of food and raise \$125,000 during March. We can help! Bring food pantry items or hygiene supplies to drop off in our grocery cart and/or give a financial gift to help CES make purchases.

*Items suggested: Cooking oils, sugar and flour, toilet paper, hygiene products (deodorant, toothbrushes and paste), canned chicken, tuna & chili.

Nearly one in ten Minnesotans experience food insecurity (*US Dept. of Agriculture*) 13.8% of children in Minnesota are food insecure (*Feeding America*). Food security is "access by all people at all times to enough food for an active, healthy lifestyle." Food insecurity means access to adequate food is inconsistent and limited by a lack of money and other resources through the year. Food insecure households report their diets to be of reduced quality, variety, or desirability and/or experience disrupted eating patterns and reduced food intake.



Nigeria's Persecuted Christians

In November Brad Holt and his daughter Karin visited our companion church in West Africa.

During the two-week visit to the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria (LCCN) one theme was repeated by the people: we are living in an atmosphere of persecution! At Mount Olive we are well aware of the name Boko Haram, because we know the name of one of the original Chibok girls who was kidnapped, Naomi Bitrus. I was able to send her one of our church bulletins by hand, although I was not able to meet her. Boko Haram, although it does kill Muslims that it disapproves of,

recently chose eleven Christians for execution. This underlines its animus against Christians, which it has demonstrated by church burnings and even assassination of priests and ministers.

But Boko Haram is only one element of the persecution experienced by Christians. More violent in recent years have been the Fulani herdsmen armed with AK47s who have slain whole villages of Christians. They lead their cattle into farm fields and thus destroy a whole year's crop in a few minutes.

The most pervasive persecution, however, is neither of these violent abusers, but the daily discrimination by Muslims in positions of authority. Whether you wish to get a driver's license, purchase a field, enter a university, or defend from sexual assault, you cannot have confidence that your rightful request will be handled with justice. This has been the case ever since the great Jihad of Usman dan Fodio about the year 1800. In the so-called Middle Belt of Nigeria, the band of land between the South and the North, populations have lived under Muslim dominance since that Jihad. Nowadays they are acutely aware that their rights are not being honored.

The police in Nigeria are not prepared to do the sorts of things they rightly do in our country. They do not have sophisticated instruments nor well-educated detectives to solve property crimes, nor do they always honor the dignity of the complainant. So-called white-collar crimes, such as those referred to above, seems to be beyond their purview. Since the enforcement of the laws is weak and selective, it can be argued that Nigerians live in a society where the laws are tentative and protection under the law is unsure.

Nevertheless, the Christian church is thriving in Nigeria. Most have not experienced the persecution first-hand, but only have read or heard of it. The churches are bursting with people, the worship services are full of joy, and the number of pastors in the LCCN increases apace to meet the needs of over two million members. The archbishop is respected by all, including myself, and is working hard to reconcile enemies, to expand the church through Nigerian missionaries, and to enhance the education and the liturgical practice of the whole church. (By the way, I was able to give two sections of our paschal candle from last year to two Lutheran cathedrals as a sign of friendship.)

If only our friendship with these Lutheran Christians far away could lead their commitment and joy to "infect" us, who do not experience the same persecution that they do!
