The Church has left the building

At the end of our liturgies we say: "Go in peace, to love and serve as Christ." It is the great second part of what liturgy is about. "GO" - take the strength just inspired into us and go be in and of the world, serve. Hopefully, our vigor in liturgy matches the vigor outside the walls.

These past three months and especially the things we've just experienced this past weekend will be permanently and prominently etched in my mind, forever.

This past weekend, it appeared things might go one horrific step further than only being in the state of the pandemic and simply not being able to gather or sing together. There was the very real concern that we might also lose the very building altogether through destructive violence. The place where we gather in all its beauty, the spaces, its inhabitants in the columbarium, the instruments it contains (which serve as our partners for singing) was in the path of danger.

Go in peace. To love and serve as Christ.

The relief felt upon seeing the building standing, mostly untouched was quickly countered by the grief and shock upon seeing first-hand the destruction on Lake Street and Chicago Ave. last Friday and Saturday morning.

On the northeast and northwest corners and then down the block north along Chicago Ave., most structures are completely destroyed by fire. Apartments and all their inhabitants' belongings gone. I heard that the Red Cross has put the residents up in hotels while they sort out what's next for them. On the south corners, severe vandalism – including the Work Force Center, the new building and restaurant on the corner, and the laundromat. The destruction is all up and down Lake Street – especially east of Chicago.

As I walked around the neighborhood each morning in the aftermath, I've had more meaningful conversations with those who live around us this past weekend than I have in the 19 years I've been here. These are great people – across Chicago Ave., behind us across the alley, watching out for us as people approached the building with perhaps malintent. One neighbor who coaches young basketball teams was visited by a former player hurt by the tear gas needing help. Other people brought brooms and dustpans to help clean up the shattered glass from the bus stops. People pulled up with donations of water and food to distribute. People tucked our huge garbage dumpsters deep in their backyards as to not have them easily accessible to arsons. We have been through a common trauma, yet there is wonderful energy around us, welcoming us to be with them in addition to them with us helping each other do what needs to be done now.

I yearn for the day when we can once again “gather in song, our hearts aglow” (ELW 627, “Oh, Day Full of Grace,” st. 5), when we can hug, when I can play the organ to help us sing as loud as we want, shout “amen” as loud as we feel, eat bread and drink wine as we sing for as long as we can. We long for when we can again gather and check up on each other following our liturgy. Yet, we are bid:

Go in peace to love and serve as Christ.

There is a lot of need surrounding us, and right now there is a lot of hurt surrounding us. There is need within each of us. It's been there all along, but now is showing itself big time. Time to listen to that, hear it, and offer what we can, hear what we can, learn what we can. Time to ask, “does the vigor of our liturgy match the vigor of our serving and being Christ?” There is real racism – chronically so – that we must insist get worked on. Our siblings around the Chicago and Lake neighborhoods need resources we have access to, and many of them have resources we can assist them in distributing. Time to work together on spreading those out as the “fire of [God's] love.”

Our church is not closed, it has just left the building. Once we are able to return to the INSIDE together, let us not forget to keep looking around us as we leave again, remembering that the liturgy is not over.

Go in peace, to love and serve as Christ.

COVID-19 and Our Mission Partners

Mission Partner Update--Southern Africa



Our mission partner in Southern Africa is ELCA missionary Rev. Dr. Philip Knutson. We began sponsoring Phil many years ago when he was a missionary specifically to South Africa. Today he is the ELCA Global Mission regional program director for all of Southern Africa. Phil was raised in South Africa, and he and his wife Lou remained in Johannesburg with their family when the CoVid19 pandemic began. We had hoped to host Pastor Knutson on June 21 when he was to be in the United States and to hear from him directly. In lieu of that, we share with you portions of Pastor Knutson's May 25 blog entry.

“South Africa has recorded the highest number of confirmed COVID-19 cases thus far (over 22,000 as of May 25) among the ten countries in the Southern Africa region. On May 18, Presiding Bishop C. Faindi of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zimbabwe shared the following information: COVID 19 deaths have remained low since its arrival, but as winter is coming, the authorities have anticipated a heavy upswing and decided not to lift the lockdown. The food situation continues to be unbearable. While there are promises to assure people that no one is going to die of hunger, if these are not fulfilled soon, people may starve to death. However, we have encouraged our members to share what they have with others and fulfill God’s command. Please continue to pray for us, as we fight the invisible enemy. Be blessed.

“ELCA Global Mission continues to support mission personnel, companion churches, mission outreach and Diakonia/World Hunger development and disaster response projects as much as possible during this difficult and uncertain time. Leaders of Lutheran churches in the region have expressed their appreciation for the ongoing companionship of the ELCA Global Mission and ELCA Companion Synods and offer their prayers in return.”

Once again, as with our partners in Nigeria and India, we hear that the availability of food has been made significantly more difficult by the pandemic and the associated lockdowns. We hold all of our mission partners in prayer and support during this trying time.

Stewardship Reminder

Thank you everyone for your compassion and commitment to Mount Olive. We want to make the process of supporting our church financially easy and convenient for everyone. If you are okay with the delay in the deposit posting to your account, please feel free to continue sending your offering via US mail. If you would like, we have alternative methods for giving that you may want to consider:

- **Bill Pay:** You can set up a regular offering through your bank by calling and talking to someone or by logging in online. You tell your bank how much to send, how often and they will electronically transfer the amount. This service is most often free of charge and already used by many at Mount Olive.
- **Electronic Funds Transfer:** Set up a regular deduction from your bank account through the church's existing account with Vanco Services. Contact the church office to set this up and a form will be mailed or emailed to you (or use the link in the cover page of this *Olive Branch* email). Complete the form and send it back to the church office either by US mail or via email.
- **Mount Olive Website:** You can donate by credit card through the church website. Visit www.mountolivechurch.org, go the very bottom of the home page and a "Donate" link is on the left. This method is good for one-time donations rather than recurring donations as the fees charged to Mount Olive per transaction are higher than the other two methods.
