Bishop Eaton's 2020 Christmas Greeting

We Are Never Alone

The room was spare and dimly lit. We sat on folding chairs in a circle—young Honduran women and some of us from the ELCA. We had come to Honduras to observe the work of AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities). This is the ELCA's strategy to help youth who have been forced to flee their home countries because of violence, abuse, extortion by gangs and extreme poverty. Amparo is the Spanish word for shelter or refuge. In this case, AMMPARO partnered with the Lutheran World Federation and the Mennonites to resettle returned migrants—those who had tried to seek asylum in the United States but had failed or had been denied and deported back to Honduras. One by one they told us their stories of fear and desperation. Not a one undertook the long and dangerous trek north on a whim. They told us about the abuse they had suffered, about family members who had been killed by gangs, about the inability to make a living because of the extortion by organized crime. They talked about the bitter sadness of leaving home and family, and the uncertainty of the future.

I remember one young woman in particular. She was pregnant when she tried to migrate to the United States. She had the baby somewhere along the way. She was far from home, mostly alone and desperately wanted her mother to be with her. None of this is what she had hoped for when she was growing up. Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new and strange existence. She and her baby were now back in Honduras—but not at home. Home was too dangerous.

Remember last Christmas? Remember all of the preparations, the travel to be with family? Remember the holy beauty of the Christmas Eve liturgy and receiving Christ's grace and forgiveness at his table? The shopping and Christmas caroling? The in-person gatherings? All that has changed. The pandemic hasn't forced us from our homes but into our homes, sheltering in place, isolated. Not together, but physically distanced. Not gathered with family and friends, but forced apart because of the threat of infection. Forced by circumstances beyond our control into this strange existence. Oh, there will be Christmas carols piped into grocery stores and other essential services, but they will be painful reminders of how life used to be.

We are reminded of the experience of the exiles in Babylon: "By the rivers of Babylon—there we sat down and there we wept when we remembered Zion. On the willows there we hung up our harps. For there our captives asked us for songs, and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying, 'Sing us one of the songs of Zion!' How could we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land" (Psalm 137)?

Midweek Advent Worship: Final Week

Under normal circumstances, it is our practice to gather midweek during the seasons of Advent and Lent. This provides us with an opportunity for deeper contemplation and prayer together in these two introspective and preparatory seasons. For liturgy at home use in our pandemic-induced year of exile, for Advent we offer two forms of observing Advent between Sundays.

1. An order for prayer in the home. A brief order of prayer to be used in the home will be provided each week. A simple service of the Word, at the center of this rite are a Scripture reading reflecting the themes of the Sunday of that week, a second reading or poem connected to that Scripture, and an invitation to intercessory prayer. The rite is begun with the lighting of an Advent wreath, or even a simple arrangement of four candles, as the prayer begins. This is suitable for morning or evening prayer, or prayer at the dinner table, and could be used every day during the week if desired.

2. An audio/video of the ancient prayer office of Compline (Prayer at the Close of the Day).

This service is the centuries old “bedtime prayer” of the Christian community. It is a 15- minute brief pattern of prayer intended for use just before extinguishing the lights at bedtime. An important dimension to this simple service is in its repetition – the more it is prayed, the more internalized it becomes. This audio/video can be used for prayer once or more each week at the close of your day during Advent. The service will not change during Advent except for an increase of the number of candles lighted on the wreath. The video consists solely of the candles of Mount Olive’s Advent wreath, and the words of the liturgy. Participants may prefer to light the candles of a home Advent wreath rather than viewing it on the video, using only the audio for the prayer office. The more often the service is prayed, you may join in as much as you’d like, or remain a participant through listening alone. For those who might wish to print a copy of the service (with music), a pdf below is provided. Our thanks to singers of the Cantorei for providing this worship aid for Advent. A link to the next week’s Compline liturgy will be sent each Saturday night with the brief order of home prayer, to be available throughout the coming week.

Thank you everyone for your compassion and commitment to Mount Olive. We want to make the process of supporting our church financially easy and convenient for everyone. If you are okay with the delay in the deposit posting to your account, please feel free to continue sending your offering via US mail. If you would like, we have alternative methods for giving that you may want to consider:

• **Bill Pay:** You can set up a regular offering through your bank by calling and talking to someone or by logging in online. You tell your bank how much to send, how often and they will electronically transfer the amount. This service is most often free of charge and already used by many at Mount Olive.

• **Electronic Funds Transfer:** Set up a regular deduction from your bank account through the church's existing account with Vanco Services. Contact the church office to set this up and a form will be mailed or emailed to you. Complete the form and send it back to the church office either by US mail or via email.

• **Mount Olive Website:** You can donate by credit card through the church website. Visit our site www.mountolivechurch.org, go the very bottom of the home page and a "Donate" link is on the left. This method is good for one-time donations rather than recurring donations as the fees charged to Mount Olive per transaction are higher than the other two methods.

Light, Hope and Love for the Winter Ahead~ Connie and Rod Olson

As I was pushing the snow off the surface of the deck this winter, I thought about how many times friends brought light into our lives by paying a visit and sharing a cup of coffee with us.

The first time was in early May when the days had turned from cold into tolerable, from winter into spring. Our two granddaughters were on a break from school and they had asked if they could stop by. I jumped at the chance to get out fancy dishes and a tablecloth. There were also precious spring flowers starting to bloom. I picked a couple of little vases full and added them to the pretty table. The tea had been made, the scones were coming out of the oven and we waited in anticipation of our guests arrival. What a wonderful time we had and when they left we realized that we had been filled with their sunshine, with the joy of their presence in our lives.

Little did we know that this first tea party would be one of many throughout the summer. We invited Mount Olive friends....two at a time so that we could be socially distanced. If a stretch of good weather was before us, we invited people for every day of the week!

One of the most memorable times was when a friend from another parish came for coffee. She recently has been diagnosed with stage four cancer. She also has dementia so that her cancer diagnosis is not part of her understanding. She was so happy to be with us and that joy of life was truly evident in the short time she spent with us. Her husband also noticed it and asked if they could come again the next week. So they became regulars on the deck. Every time they were here we were uplifted by her enjoyment of the moment and her appreciation of nature. She gave us light and hope and love by her presence.

We hope that our parties on the deck have given us enough light to last through the dark winter ahead.

Marking Epiphany in the Home

January 6 is the Festival of the Epiphany, when the Western church remembers the coming of three sages from the East to welcome the Christ child. This was the heralding of the coming of the Christ for all people, all nations. One family or community tradition for celebrating Epiphany is to make a Kings cake. Any pound cake or Bundt cake with an almond hidden inside will work. Whoever finds the almond in their slice of cake becomes Queen or King for the day and does secret kindnesses for the others in the household. In France, the day is celebrated with a cake called Galette des Rois (<https://cooking.nytimes.com/recipes/1019114-galette-des-rois>), in Spain, with Roscon, and in Mexico, Rosca des Reyes. To prepare your home for Epiphany consider making straw stars or folding origami stars (look online for simple instructions) and hanging them from the ceiling or windows. Make one star larger than the others. Hang it in a central place, or over your creche. If you have a creche with free-standing figures, move the three sages to the stable. Or light many candles, to celebrate the Light of the World.

Another old tradition for Epiphany is the blessing of the home. With a piece of chalk, mark the year, the letters "C M B" and four crosses above the lintel of the doorway into the household [20 + C + M + B + 20]. The letters stand both for the traditional names of the three sages (Caspar, Melchior, Balthasar) and also for the words, "Christus Mansionem Benedicat," "May Christ bless this house," which are said as the lintel is inscribed. The following prayer may be said: "God of heaven and earth, you revealed the Christ to all nations by the guidance of a star. Bless this home and all who dwell in it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out into the world for all. In Christ's name we pray, Amen." I told the young Honduran woman about another young woman who was forced to leave home because of a government decree. She, too, was pregnant and made a long and difficult journey. She, too, was far from home and without her mother when the baby came. She had to find shelter wherever she could. This wasn't what she had hoped for when she was growing up. Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new existence.

That young woman was Mary and the child was Jesus. Precisely in our distress, in our dislocation, the Lord shows up. Emmanuel—God with us—makes his home in the very places we find foreign or isolating. The young Honduran woman, and all of us, can find hope because of the birth of Mary's child. There is no God-forsaken place and we are never alone— not in hospital rooms, or sheltering in place, or Zoom calls or on dangerous roads. Many of us will not be physically home for Christmas, but we are truly home in Christ.
