We do not yet know

It's OK not to know what the future holds, if you know who holds you in the future. That's what the elder of 1 John will say to us this Sunday.

Our leadership is having all sorts of conversations about how to open up as the pandemic eases. What we don't know complicates our conversations. We don't know how quickly we'll reach a vaccination level that means greater safety and fewer restrictions. We don't know if the spiking rates this week will level off as the also-climbing vaccination rates continue their arc. We don't know about when and how children can be vaccinated. We're making our plans fully aware that there are and will be many things unknown.

There always are. The elder says God's love is known by this: we are God's children. But, the elder says, what we don't know is what that will fully look like as we grow into our true identity. We see glimpses of Christ in each other, of divine love, as the Spirit changes us, and also glimpses and moments of what we're growing out of.

But know this, the elder says: you are already God's children. You are held by God whose love broke through the power of death for you and the whole creation. It's OK not to know what the future holds if you know who holds you in the future.

Beloved, you are God's child, now. Held in God's undying love. Being changed into your true identity. Together, we'll find the future, a day a time, in that love that binds us and sends us into the world for healing.

Stewardship News

Thank you everyone for your compassion and commitment to Mount Olive. We want to make the process of supporting our church financially easy and convenient for everyone. If you are okay with the delay in the deposit posting to your account, please feel free to continue sending your offering via US mail. If you would like, we have alternative methods for giving that you may want to consider:

• Bill Pay: You can set up a regular offering through your bank by calling and talking to someone or by logging in online. You tell your bank how much to send, how often and they will electronically transfer the amount. This service is most often free of charge and already used by many at Mount Olive.

- Electronic Funds Transfer: Set up a regular deduction from your bank account through the church's existing account with Vanco Services. Contact the church office to set this up and a form will be mailed or emailed to you. Complete the form and send it back to the church office either by US mail or via email.
- Mount Olive Website: You can donate by credit card through the church website. Visit our site www.mountolivechurch.org, go the very bottom of the home page and a "Donate" link is on the left. This method is good for one-time donations rather than recurring donations as the fees charged to Mount Olive per transaction are higher than the other two methods.

Next MFA Event: The OK Factor, April 18, 4:00 pm

The OK Factor's program is a curated mix of our original, folkinspired compositions influenced by multiple genres, as well as audience favorites such as "Shenandoah," "Here Comes the Sun," and vocal tunes such as Bob Dylan's "You're Gonna Make Me Lonesome." Olivia and Karla share our experiences with these tunes and their creation from the stage as a point of connection with audiences, inviting them to experience the music's vulnerability and hear their own stories reflected in it.

Olivia Diercks and Karla Colahan - cellist and violinist of the newclassical crossover duo, The OK Factor - have one word to describe their musical connection: lucky. The almost telepathic way they respond to one another is palpable to the audiences they capture during performances, as is their spontaneity and joy. Organic and genuine, their original compositions and arrangements feel both comfortingly familiar and uniquely fresh, and have been described as "genre-bending" (Julie Amacher, MPR) and "pure magic" (Wausau Pilot & Review).

COVID Vaccine Resources

We have had a year unlike any other! It was just a year ago that we had to cancel our Holy Week liturgies and celebrations. And now we face this loss once again. But hope is on the horizon with the development and implementation of the COVID vaccines. There are currently three vaccines authorized for emergency use in Minnesota. The supply is still limited so it will take longer than desired before everyone can get the vaccine. The goal for the first, limited doses of COVID-19 vaccine has been to immunize for impact – meaning the vaccine is being offered initially to those at highest risk of getting COVID-19 and those most at risk of severe disease and complications if they get COVID-19. Now that we are nearing the beginning of April most people at highest risk have received at least one dose of the vaccine (health care workers, patients age 65 and older, educators/childcare workers). Recently some locations have started scheduling people ages 16-64 with high-risk health conditions to receive the vaccine. As more people get vaccinated and more vaccine becomes available, more will have their turn to get vaccinated. Minnesota has a plan mapped out that describes who is currently being vaccinated and who will be vaccinated soon. Most health care systems & providers are providing vaccine clinics/hubs in addition to some statewide community vaccine clinics. Most of us should be able to get scheduled with our primary health care provider or local pharmacy for the vaccine by calling them or scheduling on-line. That's why Minnesota continues to send more doses of COVID-19 vaccine to local health care providers and pharmacies. Most health care systems are reaching out to patients who are in the current risk group eligible for the available vaccines. Given the short supply and the variety of vaccine locations it can be confusing to know where to go or even how to get your questions answered. Included are several links to key sections about the vaccine at the Minnesota Department of Health website that can walk people through how to connect to get a vaccine scheduled if you have not already done so. If you don't have an ability to access these links there is a help line at the state as well. For general questions about COVID-19 resources, call the Minnesota Helpline at 651-297-1304 or 1-800-657-3504 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. For general health questions about COVID-19 and vaccines, press 2 or 3 for the Minnesota Department of Health Public Hotline.

Building Our Home

This week launches a series highlighting some of the specific properties that will be funded in part by the Building Our Home initiative. It is hoped that this will make the work more concrete (literally and figuratively).

Please note, a glossary of some basic terms will be included at the end of this section for each week of this series since there are some terms used in the property descriptions that may not be familiar to all readers. This section will repeat each week.

Bimosedaa is a property being developed by our partner Beacon Interfaith in downtown Minneapolis. Bimodedaa will provide 50 units of supportive housing for adults with mental illness and chemical dependency with a history of homelessness. This property is being developed in partnership with Red Lake Nation as a response to the Wall of Forgotten Natives encampment and Navigation Center. Currently, the public capital and the property have been secured; Beacon is raising private capital and is planning to break ground on this development in Spring of 2021.

Commonly Used Terms and Abbreviations

AMI: Average Median Income; the average amount made by households in a given area; currently, the AMI for the Twin Cities metro area for a family of four is \$103,400 (one earner making \$49.71 per hour). As one example, 30% AMI, often a measure of housing considered to be the most affordable, would be \$31,000 (one earner making \$14.90 per hour), making a three-bedroom apartment affordable at \$806 per month. For comparison, the average rent for a three-bedroom unit in the Twin Cities in 2019 was \$1,624.

Affordable Housing: Defined as housing that can be obtained and maintained for 30% or less of a households' monthly income. By definition, housing costs include all costs related to maintaining a home - utilities, trash disposal, insurance, and the like - not just rent or mortgage.

Supportive Housing: Affordable, long-term, community-based housing with on-site support services such as employment counseling, addiction recovery support, etc. for people with multiple barriers to getting and keeping housing.

The Initiative

Working with three non-profit affordable housing developers, Beacon Interfaith, Aeon, and Alliance Housing, Mount Olive is working to build over 2100 units of affordable and supportive housing with a funding goal of 21.3 million dollars. Though our Neighborhood Ministry leadership, Mount Olive is seeking partnerships with its Twin Cities sister congregations of the Evangelical Church of America, along with other faith communities, organizations, and individuals.
