Accent on Worship

I will admit to being ridiculously excited that I get to write an Accent on Worship on the week Acts 8:26-40 is one of our chosen readings. For me, this text has both personal and professional significance. For the sake of space, I will not reprint the whole text here, but I urge you to read this passage as an accompaniment to your reading of this article.

Personally, I have experienced the kind of Holy Spirit prompting that led Philip to start off on this walk and begin conversation with this unnamed eunuch. I will not claim to get it right every time, but it is a powerful thing to come to know and recognize the voice of the Spirit saying, "hey - go over there" or "go talk to that person" and then seeing what God will do though that conversation.

Professionally, this story illustrates a wonderful progression that forms a foundation for a significant part of neighborhood ministry.

First, there is the prompting. The writer of Acts attributes the prompting to "an angel of the Lord." Whether an angel or the Holy Spirit, regardless, it is clear the prompting is coming from God's own self. Through experiences we are not privileged to know about, Philip has come to recognize this voice. I would argue that the voice of the Spirit is most recognizable when we, first, take time to listen - to be attentive. And along with that, spending regular time in God's word through reading, prayer, singing, and listening, on our own and in community, helps us to recognize and distinguish God's voice from others that may enter our thoughts.

Second, there is an action. Philip does what he hears God say. This may sometimes be the most difficult part. It is easy to dismiss what we sense God saying for other priorities on the task list. I've been there. But Philip acts, beginning a journey of unknown length. Acts only tells us that the upcoming encounter takes places on the road from Jerusalem to Gaza - which is a significant trip - not that Philip actually

covers the whole distance. But he goes. And he again listens to the Spirit (this time, the Spirit is attributed with the prompting) and joins an Ethiopian eunuch in his chariot.

I think it worthwhile to at least acknowledge that this person Philip is prompted to visit is somehow a believer and worshipper of the God of the Hebrews - he has made a significant journey to worship this God and is now returning home. However, by the old covenant laws, this person would have been twice excluded from regular fellowship in the Jewish community, once because of ancestry and twice because of his status as a eunuch (Deuteronomy 23:1). He also likely has a much darker complexion than Philip or many others living around Jerusalem. He was likely black. But he was a neighbor (Luke 10) and that is enough.

Third, Philip engages this person in conversation, answering his questions about Scripture, which then prompts a request for baptism. For many, perhaps some of you, if you were to mirror your actions on those of Philip, this may be the most terrifying portion. Please don't let it be so. The same encouragement I gave above - spending time in Scripture through reading, prayer, singing, and hearing - provides a foundation which the Spirit herself can use in these conversations, inspiring you with the words and actions needed.

I pray that this story can serve for you as a powerful illustration of how God can choose to work in us as we interact with our neighbors on a daily basis. I pray that you will join me in listening for the Spirit's prompting and be willing to take action, guided by that same Spirit. Sometimes that action might look like giving diapers, a bottle of water, a sandwich, help with a house project, or simply a warm greeting on the sidewalk - but with the Spirit - I pray that it might always be a reflection of God's love at work in us.

• Bill Pay: You can set up a regular offering through your bank by calling and talking to someone or by logging in online. You tell your bank how much to send, how often and they will electronically transfer the amount. This service is most often free of charge and already used by many at Mount Olive.

- Electronic Funds Transfer: Set up a regular deduction from your bank account through the church's existing account with Vanco Services. Contact the church office to set this up and a form will be mailed or emailed to you. Complete the form and send it back to the church office either by US mail or via email.
- Mount Olive Website: You can donate by credit card through the church website. Visit our site www.mountolivechurch.org, go the very bottom of the home page and a "Donate" link is on the left. This method is good for one-time donations rather than recurring donations as the fees charged to Mount Olive per transaction are higher than the other two methods.



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Building Our Home

This week launches a series highlighting some of the specific properties that will be funded in part by the Building Our Home initiative. It is hoped that this will make the work more concrete (literally and figuratively).

Please note, a glossary of some basic terms will be included at the end of this section for each week of this series since there are some terms used in the property descriptions that may not be familiar to all readers. This section will repeat each week.

This week's featured project has no actual name, fitting for its unique nature. Our partner Alliance has been given a grant of \$1 million to purchase duplexes and four-plexes in Minneapolis and Saint Paul proper. After purchase, Alliance will make any needed repairs and then making these houses available to families at an affordable rate. Any additional money given to this project, like that coming from Building Our Home, will enable the purchase and rehabilitation of more properties, making this project almost infinitely expandable. This project is especially important because it helps to preserve one of the most cost-effective forms of affordable housing - that which already exists and simply needs to be preserved (otherwise referred to as NOAH - Naturally Occurring Affordable Housing).

Commonly Used Terms and Abbreviations

AMI: Average Median Income; the average amount made by households in a given area; currently, the AMI for the Twin Cities metro area for a family of four is \$103,400 (one earner making \$49.71 per hour). As one example, 30% AMI, often a measure of housing considered to be the most affordable, would be \$31,000 (one earner making \$14.90 per hour), making a three-bedroom apartment affordable at \$806 per month. For comparison, the average rent for a three-bedroom unit in the Twin Cities in 2019 was \$1,624.

Affordable Housing: Defined as housing that can be obtained and maintained for 30% or less of a households' monthly income. By definition, housing costs include all costs related to maintaining a home - utilities, trash disposal, insurance, and the like - not just rent or mortgage.

Supportive Housing: Affordable, long-term, community-based housing with on-site support services such as employment counseling, addiction recovery support, etc. for people with multiple barriers to getting and keeping housing.

The Initiative

Working with three non-profit affordable housing developers, Beacon Interfaith, Aeon, and Alliance Housing, Mount Olive is working to build over 2100 units of affordable and supportive housing with a funding goal of 21.3 million dollars. Though our Neighborhood Ministry leadership, Mount Olive is seeking partnerships with its Twin Cities sister congregations of the Evangelical Church of America, along with other faith communities, organizations, and individuals.
