Seating for more?

As we continue to ease back into our worship life together again this summer, this Sunday brings with it another adjustment. If the pandemic has taught us anything, it certainly has taught us that we need to remain flexible, responding as we need to meaningfully do what we do together in our liturgy in a safe way.

We began coming gradually out of exile with three services, to accommodate distancing. After doing this for one month, we now know that given the number coming to each, we can adjust to two services and still accomplish the distancing. They will be 9 and 11 am, right smack between the former three service times. This schedule will be maintained for the rest of the summer months. We are still asking for the RSVP to help ensure as even a distribution as possible between these two times (yet no one will be turned away). Remembering what I call the magic of our summer liturgy in normal situations, (one service, well attended by many, with singing off the charts strong!) it's important to remember that we're still not quite back to former ways, but we are moving in that direction.

So far no one opts to sit in the front upper balconies (transept balconies). My very first time at Mount Olive was in the late 1970s. I attended a hymn festival on Palm Sunday, led by Drs. Wedel and Manz. What I didn't realize is how early I should have come to get a "good seat." Those of you who remember these have since told me how the church would completely fill up an hour in advance. I wound up in the farthest SW corner of the South Transept balcony. I figured I'd hear little, and not see anything. I was wrong. The sound up there was amazingly clear, even the quietest music. And I could very clearly see the chancel and Dr. Wedel as he read the commentaries between the hymns. I was very much a part of every detail of that program, and it was a deep, highly impressionable experience.

My point is this: give those spots a try! If we seem filled up on the main level, there can be some prime seating up there if steps are not yet an issue for you. I can assure you that sight lines and sound are still very good up there.

What is bringing me such joy is that we are again able to come together. This is the battery charge I took for granted and especially missed. With our ability to distance, wearing masks, we are confident that what we're doing is indeed safe, especially considering a high rate of vaccination among those who come and make up our assemblies. It brings me joy to see the young ones that Chandler Molbert and I met with each week on Zoom during our exile – in person! (And they've grown taller!).

Changes in the Sunday Morning Schedule Effective this Sunday, July 4.

As was previously announced, there will now be **two worship services on Sunday morning, at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.** In addition, the Congregational Life committee will begin serving coffee following each service. In order to continue COVID-related safety measures, we ask the following:

We will continue to request R.S.V.P responses for each worship in order to allow for physical distancing in the sanctuary. This is especially important to protect those who are not vaccinated, including children.

We have not yet had to utilize the transept balconies for seating, but this may be needed in the future. Please be aware that if you are able to climb stairs, you may be asked to sit in the balcony. We appreciate your willingness to do this on occasion.

His passion is working with them to give them job skills and provide guidance about 'hard work builds character.' Building Our Home

The series highlighting some of the specific properties that will be funded in part by the Building Our Home initiative continues this week. It is hoped that this will make the work more concrete (literally and figuratively).

Please note, a glossary of some basic terms will be included at the end of this section for each week of this series since there are some terms used in the property descriptions that may not be familiar to all readers. This section will repeat each week.

Our featured property this week is American House. American House is a renovation project led by Beacon Interfaith that will upgrade 70 homes in the lower town area of Saint Paul, making them accessible to residents who require intensive case management services and low barriers to entry. These types of homes have been shown to be the most effective form of housing for people who have experienced repeated or long-term instances of homelessness. American House will serve the most vulnerable in our community.

Commonly Used Terms and Abbreviations

AMI: Average Median Income; the average amount made by households in a given area; currently, the AMI for the Twin Cities metro area for a family of four is \$103,400 (one earner making \$49.71 per hour). As one example, 30% AMI, often a measure of housing considered to be the most affordable, would be \$31,000 (one earner making \$14.90 per hour), making a three-bedroom apartment affordable at \$806 per month. For comparison, the average rent for a three-bedroom unit in the Twin Cities in 2019 was \$1,624.

Affordable Housing: Defined as housing that can be obtained and maintained for 30% or less of a household's monthly income. By definition, housing costs include all costs related to maintaining a home - utilities, trash disposal, insurance, and the like - not just rent or mortgage.

Supportive Housing: Affordable, long-term, community-based housing with on-site support services such as employment counseling, addiction recovery support, etc. for people with multiple barriers to getting and keeping housing.

The Initiative

Working with three non-profit affordable housing developers, Beacon Interfaith, Aeon, and Alliance Housing, Mount Olive is working to build over 2100 units of affordable and supportive housing with a funding goal of 21.3 million dollars. Through our Neighborhood Ministry leadership, Mount Olive is seeking partnerships with its Twin Cities sister congregations of the Evangelical Church of America, along with other faith communities, organizations, and individuals.
