Reformation

This Sunday, October 31st, is actually Reformation Day. Normally we transfer it to Sunday, as we also do with All Saints Day, which is November 1. This year, Reformation Day actually falls on Sunday (October 31), but All Saints will be celebrated one week later on November 7. These two festivals, however, are not necessarily related.

There much that can be said about Reformation Day. For so long churches celebrated the person: Martin Luther, and commemorated his nailing of the 95 thesis on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenburg, Germany, thus launching the reformation of the church. These contemporary celebrations seemed to be more about that one event, more about the culture where that event took place (Germany) and focused on looking back. Not to shatter the bubble, but he was not the only reformer, and his hope was not to form a new church body and create a separation. His hope was a call to think about what we believe and do about faith.

What Luther "launched" was an on-going state of being: "in reform." We can look at "the Reformation" as a continuing aspect of being church, of being people of God. How we understand God, questions we have about God and our faith can be thought about, researched, and we change as a result. If this process stops, I guess, we are no longer people of reformation. So rather than singing German chorales and use Luther's settings of the Ordinary of the Mass to commemorate this day, over the years we have sung things that give evidence to how God's people in Christ has spread around all of time and space on earth. We have indeed changed! For some, not fast enough. For others, plenty fast.

Lutheran music, therefore, is not just chorales from the 15th century, although beloved. To me what makes music "Lutheran" is that we all sing it. Not just professionals. This was one of the facets of reform spawned by Luther. This did not mean dumbing down music, but it did mean using the best crafted texts and music which also embodied the language and culture at the time, along with the understanding about God at the time. The German language "flowed" better with the rhythmic dance of the Renaissance music than with Gregorian chant with its melodic fluidity, yet both are important parts of our "tradition." Our current hymn books give evidence to this process having never stopped, as we have representative songs from all sorts of times and spaces on earth – from most continents. Someday, maybe we'll add a "Martian" hymn.... (hmmm)

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If anything can be contemplated this Sunday, as always, it would be what the Word of God is telling us. The Gospel says "Continue in God's Word" – coupled with the Romans second lesson, that faith is a gift from God. We do not need to earn or buy it. It is truly amazing how difficult this still seems to be. Our capitalist culture is so steeped on earning, growth, acquisition – the concept of gift is almost foreign to us except wrapped boxes with bows and a card (which I love too, by the way). Yet there it is, waiting for us to notice. This is also an invitation to the church – do we see our communities of faith as our culture does (thirsting for growth, acquisition, building "equity"), or do we regard church as gift? Receiving a gift is one thing which comes hard for many of us, and for which we should indeed be thankful. Giving the gift away is also our calling. Our delight. To me, giving away (have we heard anything about that recently?) does what the Gospel says: it sets us free.

Perhaps one of my favorite lines in this Sunday's texts comes from Psalm 46: "Be still and know that I am God. Be still.

Be still.

Be still. Know that God is God."

Now, let's sing about THAT, and give that gift away.
