Accent on Worship

Advent

My first year as Church Musician (1981) I composed a little song for the children's choir for the first Sunday of Advent. "Don't be sleeping, watch and pray, Jesus Christ may come today." It had a cute little melody, ironically like a lullaby. Excited about publishing back then (I had just published my first organ book!) I copied it out very neatly and sent it off to a publisher. The rejection letter came pretty quickly. "Sorry" (said the publisher), "I am imagining creating a bunch of young insomniacs afraid to fall asleep with this song." Ah. Right. So, what then is Advent all about? The lessons point pretty clearly to the idea "Keep watch" - but watch ...where?

A Child-like interpretation would be to look to the sky, to see like a giant alien ship coming down in the middle of the night beaming us up one-by-one, if we see it, so don't miss it - don't miss out because you were sleeping! Something like that image is certainly there in the Advent lessons and hymnody ("Wake, Awake") but is it literal?

Another clear message also comes through during Advent - we can/should look in the unexpected places - and discover Christ born in us. In the northern hemisphere, it's dark a lot of our day - darkness brings with it an introspectiveness. It allows us to see the tiniest of light, not unlike how hard it is to see stars in cities - when it's truly dark the stars are stunningly abundant. But it needs to be dark to see them.

Advent Procession


This Sunday, November 28 - 4:00 pm

Afghan Resettlement: Waiting for a Family

Advent: Anticipating, Preparing

With the support of the Vestry, your Missions Committee is moving forward with becoming a Circle of Welcome for an Afghan family waiting to resettle to our area. Were you around when Mount Olive helped resettle refugees before? If so, you may remember what a joyous opportunity it was. We are needed again. Once again, we will work with Lutheran Social Services; since then, the process has greatly improved for both the family and for our Circle.

Are you interested in learning more about this opportunity--an opportunity where there are many places to fit in? You could be involved in gathering the needed household items. Or perhaps you'd like to take the family grocery shopping. Do you know of available housing or job possibilities? So many different talents are needed.

Join us for an information session on Saturday, December 4 at 10:00 a.m. You can join this 1.5 hour session in person in the Undercroft (masked) or at home on-line. That is step one. Let's get our questions asked and answered. Then we will put together a team and LSS will train them - Connie Marty has already volunteered to head up this effort. We will prepare what we can while we wait for a family to be assigned. That waiting could last well into the new year, depending on governmental processes.

What a wonderful way for you and your family to observe Advent--preparing and waiting for a family searching for a home. The pictured family is one of those Afghan families who recently settled in St. Paul. We wonder who we will meet. Learn more at

Communion Distribution and Gluten-free Bread

It has been our practice to celebrate the Eucharist with wafers as our bread on Sundays after Pentecost, and with loaves on feasts and from Advent to Holy Trinity. Beginning this First Sunday of Advent, we will resume this practice with a few changes.

Communion will be distributed in a familiar way: the presider will place a piece of bread in your hand, and you may eat it, then drink from the first chalice, or you may dip it in the second chalice. Please keep your mask on - nose and mouth covered - for as much time as you are able.

The Worship Committee has been looking for ways to be more inviting to those who have allergies or dietary needs. We are excited to have found a locally-owned bakery just a couple blocks from Mount Olive that specializes in gluten-free and lactose-free breads. This bakery will bake loaves that all of us can share as we celebrate Holy Communion.

Fair Trade Alternative Gift Giving

The Missions Committee is continuing the tradition hosting a virtual Fair Trade Sale. Mount Olive members and friends can use this custom link serrv.org?a=MountOlive21 to buy handmade gifts through SERV International. By using this special link 20% of all purchases will be donated to Mount Olive in support of our new Circle of Welcome work, helping to resettle an Afghan family to our area.

The Fair Trade Sale link is active **until December 17**. Orders need to be placed online through our custom link. Keep in mind the shipping delays we are experiencing and be sure to order early!

We will also bring back our Equal Exchange coffee, cocoa, and chocolate. Items will be available on the first three Sunday mornings in December. Restorative Justice Community Action (RJCA) brings residents and victims together with adults and youth who have committed crimes in their area. Together they participate in community conferences, an alternative sentencing option and restorative justice process that strengthens accountability and opens a line of communication between the offender and those harmed. The goal is to seek true restoration, especially in terms of community standing and relationship, for those who have committed crimes and the victims of those crimes.

As a reminder, Mount Olive has chosen to support each of our Partners of the Month though a yearly contribution from our budget. However, we encourage any member who wishes to contribute over and above our budgeted amount to those partners doing work in their areas of passion and concern. Quiet may well be another form of darkness – absence of the abundance of sound may well help us hear the tiniest call to let Christ be in us.

Advent is an invitation to “practice” introspective darkness, quietness – so that we can hear and feel the angel whispering in our ear, “Christ is in you.”

Liturgically, we can reflect this. For example, the prelude will be absent during Advent. Omitting it is not related in this case to penitence, but just to ... quiet. When you arrive for liturgy, sit in the quiet to prepare yourself to listen for that small voice that says, “I am with you.” The setting of the liturgy is different – a bit more stark, more silence. Less accompanied. Let it take you somewhere where you can see the smallest light, hear the smallest sound. They’re all the light and the voice of God saying, “I am with you.”

Advent can be much more than “waiting for THE baby – (Jesus on Christmas).” It’s an invitation to be quiet, reduce the distraction, to shut up and notice that Christ has been in us all this time.
