## Accent on Worship

*Bishop's 2022 Easter Message*

*I know that my Redeemer lives*

This Easter, many of us will be able to gather in person for glorious celebrations of our Lord's resurrection. But the first Easter was in a cemetery, surrounded by tombstones. The women and then the men disciples came to see what had happened to their Lord. They expected to find a dead body, but instead they found God's defiant answer to death.

As St. Paul writes in Corinthians, "Death has been swallowed up in victory. Oh, death, where is your victory? Oh, death, where is your sting?"

I know now that we're entering the third year of this pandemic, and we see the signs of stress and incivility, even the signs of war and disease in Ethiopia and Sudan, in Europe. It might seem like death still has sway, but we can declare confidently on this Easter and all times what Job said, "I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last he will stand upon the earth and after my skin has been thus destroyed, then in my flesh, I shall see God."

Centuries ago, the Russian Orthodox developed this beautiful poem, the Kontakion of the Departed. It's often used at gravesites:

*"Give rest, O Christ, to your servants with your saints, where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting. You only are immortal, the creator and maker of humankind, and we are mortal, formed of the earth and to the earth shall we return. For so you did ordain when you created a thing. You are dust and to dust you shall return. All of us go down to the dust. Yet even at the grave we make our song. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia."*

Blessed Easter, dear church.

## Neighborhood Ministry Partnership

### Highlight: Align Mpls

Since late 2019, Mount Olive has been a part of an organization called Align Mpls. This month, we are highlighting their work and some ways we as Mount Olive can partner with our fellow Align congregations.

“Align Minneapolis is an interfaith collaboration of 17 Minneapolis churches, synagogues, and mosques and people with lived experiences working together to address homelessness and poverty.” Along with the other congregations of Align, we “[focus] on shifting from an immediate needs approach to long term solutions through a combination of education, advocacy, and action.” Together, we are “committed to engage the community around us to address homelessness. Through learning, volunteer opportunities, community partnerships, community organizing, and development of effective strategies and programs.”

One of the unique aspects of Align Mpls is our cooperative work not only on our larger organizational goals mentioned above, but our support of each individual congregation in our direct service programs. Align Mpls congregations frequently hold diaper drives in support of Mount Olive’s Diaper Depot. Likewise, we have the opportunity to support the work of our partner congregations and the work of Align as a whole.

## Neighborhood Ministries Partners of the Month: Powderhorn Park Neighborhood Association and Lake Street Council

April is another month where we have chosen to feature two organizations with connected and related missions.

**The Powderhorn Park Neighborhood Association** works to enhance the lives of residents in our neighborhood through special events like the Powderhorn Park Art Fair. In addition, they communicate with and advocate for neighborhood residents on issues like housing, economic equity, safety, and security. The Powderhorn Park neighborhood is bordered by Lake Street on the north, Chicago Avenue on the west, 38th Street on the south, and Cedar Avenue on the east, putting Mount Olive right in the northwest corner of our neighborhood home.

**The Lake Street Council** serves and advocates for the Lake Street business community, working to ensure diversity and prosperity for all businesses, small and large, operating in the corridor. They do this through community events, clean energy retrofit projects, strategic planning, employee recruitment, and more. They have been and continue to be instrumental in helping businesses recover from the effects of the pandemic and the 2020 civil unrest.



### Two Outings with the Afghan Family

On the last two Fridays Susan (Snow) and I (Patsy Holtmeier) went on two outings with the mother and her children.

Our first outing was to the Children's Museum. The son, (age 3 years), loved his time there. For 3 hours he was engaged with self-directed activities. We were impressed with his interest and attention as he navigated everything available to him in a sophisticated sort of 3-year-old way. Susan said, "He's going to make it." I agree.

Our second outing was quite different. Susan and I intended to have a few hours alone with the mother, get to know each other better and practice conversational English with her. Since she had shared with us her love of flowers, we planned a trip to the flower show at the Galleria.

When I got to her house, the men had left so the mother and I had to take the two children and the two infant seats down to the car and somehow get the infant seats installed. That wasn't easy. 45 minutes later we all left for the Galleria where we met Susan. The three-year old had two close calls at the Galleria. The first was a minor fall into some flowers. The other was a giant lavender bear that almost fell over because he was poking at it. The bear was rescued by a Bachmann's guard. (But then, whoever heard of a giant lavender bear anyway? Maybe he was right to poke it!) The second outing wasn't what we had imagined.

She is a wonderful mother. Susan and I are thankful for blessings we did not know would come through the mentor program. Onward to other adventures.

## Diaper Depot Update

This week, we mark the one-year anniversary of the launch of our new Diaper Depot delivery model! And with that anniversary, we also find ourselves celebrating the growth of that program. We are serving more and more families with this important service. With that growth comes the need for more delivery drivers. Would you consider joining us in this work?

Currently, there are four of us driving diaper delivery routes. Ideally, I would like to add 2 or 3 more delivery drivers to our diaper depot program. This would lighten the load on our current drivers and allow us to better serve those in our community. Our existing drivers pick up diapers at Mount Olive and then deliver in neighborhoods close to where they live - offering them the opportunity to connect with families in their communities. We can use drivers in any part of the metro area, but in particular, we would like to add at least driver in the south suburbs (Bloomington, Richfield, Burnsville) and another one or two in the north-northeast suburbs (Fridley, Columbia Heights, New Brighton, Brooklyn Park, Brooklyn Center).

Currently, we deliver diapers on Wednesday afternoons, but there is some flexibility in that schedule. Please email me at [neighborhood@mountolivechurch.org](mailto:neighborhood@mountolivechurch.org) if you are interested in joining us in this powerful and unique program.
