Accent on Worship

Permit me a little departure from my normal pattern for these Accent on Worship articles. This week, it is a wonderful little phrase in the Prayer of the Day that caught my attention, and so there lies my focus for this week.

Here is the entirety of that prayer:

O God, form the minds of your faithful people into your one will. Make us love what you command and desire what you promise, that, amid all the changes of this world, our hearts may be fixed where true joy is found, your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

The phrase that caught my attention? "...form the minds of your faithful people into your one will. Make us love what you command and desire what you promise..."

The concept of "God's will" is a complex one, made even more complex by some seriously poor and unbiblical teaching about God's will over the 2000 or so year history of the Christian Church. While I believe striving toward God's will is a worthy pursuit, I do not know that it needs to be or should be an agonizing activity. And while God is certainly concerned, as our dear parent, about the things that concern us, I do not know that the choice of which car to purchase, which shirt to wear, or our hairstyle, are matters of which we

should be concerned about “God’s will.” I do not know either, that God’s will is entirely difficult for us to know. Scripture itself, indeed, even in this week’s Gospel reading, gives us multiple passages telling us about what God wants of their children.

I have also grown uncomfortable with the concept that we have to fight against our own will to pursue God’s will. And this concept, perhaps, forms the central thought of this article and the reason this prayer caught my attention. I have come to believe that knowing God’s will is not so much one of knowledge, but of desire. That knowing (and yes, doing) God’s will is a matter of our minds being formed by the Holy Spirit into one will - the very will of God. Or said another way, that our will - our desires - our passions - our wants - become the very will - desires - passions - wants - of God. That they become one and the same. And in that sameness, we find ourselves wanting what God wants and there is no longer a my will versus God’s will because they have become one and the same by the power of the Spirit. And how does that come about? Through the reading and hearing and singing and studying of God’s Word; through prayer; through conversation with trusted siblings in faith, through eating and drinking at God’s table.

I pray that God would form our minds into God’s own will. “Make us love what you command and desire what you promise, that, amid all the changes of this world, our hearts may be fixed where true joy is found.”

Watching a bobcat and backhoe work on a construction site was a big thrill for the little boy. The swings in the park are a favorite pastime for all. Claudia Beck and Jerry Duncan also took the kids to the park this past week, and Atticus Beck and the children happily played with building/construction toys. Normal children, doing normal children things, thanks to a refugee resettlement program and the countless hours of volunteer hours being put in by Mount Olive’s intrepid mentors.

On Sunday, June 5, Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb, co-founder of Bright Stars of Bethlehem and founder of dar al-Kalima University, will be in town to share an update of this ministry, one of Mount Olive's Global Ministry partners.

Rehab will lead a Global Mission Forum at Central Lutheran Church downtown, speaking on what is next for the university. At 2:30 that afternoon he will present a public lecture at Westminster Presbyterian Church (1200 S. Marquette Ave) entitled "The next Generation of Creative leaders in Palestine: The Power of Arts & Education." The responding panel will include local arts and education leaders. Understanding the Meaning of Juneteenth

In his sermon on May 15, Pastor Crippen delivered a message that invited us to look again at the meaning of Peter's vision as found in Acts 11. The challenge of God's vision to Peter and the heart of Pastor's sermon was this: We must examine ourselves for how we have limited what it means to be part of the family of God. Are we - intentionally or not - causing others to question if they belong? This challenge continues to be the question Mount Olive is asking itself.

As part of this journey, we will be learning about a federal holiday that came into official existence a year ago, but one which has been celebrated in the African American community for over 150 years. On June 12, 2021, President Biden signed into law Senate Bill 475 (S.475) making "Juneteenth" a federal holiday. Known as this country's "second Independence Day" to our black brothers and sisters, the holiday celebrates the freedom of enslaved people in the United States at the end of the Civil War.

On June 12, a special adult forum will be held following 10:00 a.m. worship where we will explore the meaning of this holiday as to its origins and importance to the black community. We will also look at this holiday from the perspective of liberation and Mount Olive's working for justice for all people. Resources will be provided where local events are being held to honor this remarkable and long-overlooked day of celebration. We hope you will join us for coffee and conversation.
