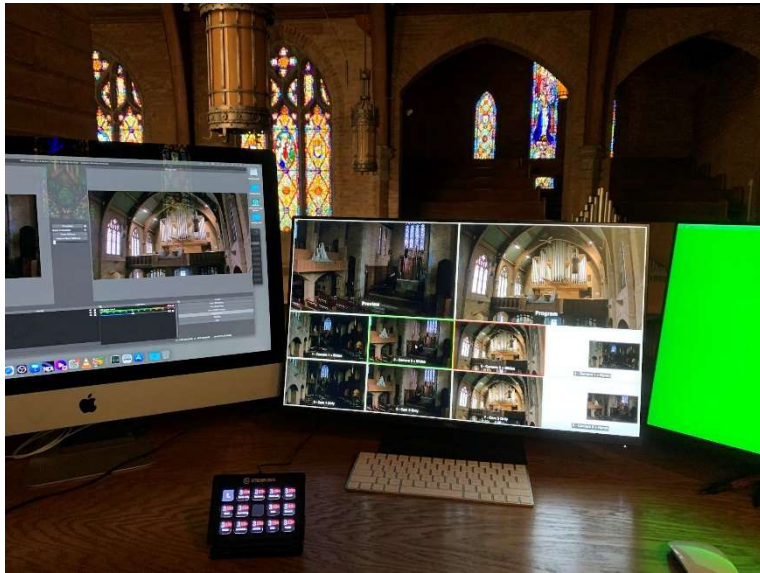
Ordinary Time

We are in another “green” stretch of liturgical time: Ordinary Time. This stretch is often called “Sundays OF Epiphany” when in fact, they are “Sundays AFTER Epiphany.”

Yet, there is indeed an “epiphany” nature to these weeks. Similar to Advent here in the northern hemisphere, this season seems connected to nature as the light is increasing (thankfully). A dictionary definition of the word “epiphany” says, “a sudden, intuitive perception of or insight into the reality or essential meaning of something, usually initiated by some simple, homely, or commonplace occurrence or experience.” During these weeks the lectionary includes narratives about some of these occurrences which illuminate (a word used intentionally) who Jesus is, and what we are to do with that recognition: follow, illuminate, be salt, etc.

Liturgically, we don’t identify this season as either festival, nor penitential. Therefore, the liturgy is to be “ordinary,” although one could easily argue that every liturgy is quite extraordinary, especially here - don’t you think? What that tends to mean for us is we do not include incense, we do not process down the aisle to read the Gospel, etc. But we do sing the Gloria with the angels each week as we live in the wake of the nativity cycle. We also sing Simeon’s song “Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace” in response to recognizing Jesus for who he is. This is important to keep in our memory banks so that when we truly need it, like when our wits aren’t so strong, it’s there deep in our souls.

It is our season of responding to our call to recognize Jesus, and to in turn, set everything aside and follow. What does that mean for you?



Additional Live Streamers Needed

We are in need of a couple more volunteers to run the live stream during worship. You'll need to be comfortable using technology, but most importantly, follow along with the liturgy and switch cameras in anticipation of what's happening next. It is important work, giving those who can not be with us in person the ability to join us in worship.

What you'll do as a live streamer: Get situated at the computer in the South Gallery and start the live stream a minute or two before the prelude begins. Follow along with the liturgy, and when we come to a transition point (e.g. a reader walks to the lectern, or a hymn is about to begin), you press a couple buttons to switch to the correct camera, move camera positions, and/or display overlay slides with music on them.

Training sessions & written directions are available. And an experienced streamer will sit by you and assist you for your first liturgies. With the addition of a couple more volunteers, each of us will be scheduled once per month.

Adult Education: *Upcoming Sunday Adult Forums* *(9:30 am in the Chapel Lounge)*

January 22: *“Daily Dying and Rising,”* part 2 of a 2-part series, led by Interim Pastor Paul Hoffman. Beginning with Romans 6 and working through Luther’s understanding of what it means to be “born again,” Paul will lead the conversation about how each day is an opportunity for both baptismal formation and baptismal living for Jesus’ disciples in the world. For 18 years, Pastor Hoffman led the ministry of the Adult Catechumenate at Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church in Seattle. During that time, the congregation reached into the community in an intentional way to offer the gift of baptism to those in Seattle who had never had the opportunity to become a part of the body of Christ. Paul’s book, *Faith Forming Faith*, is a great primer to this ministry, and a wonderful way to learn to know him a bit better as he comes to lead among us. Copies of the book are available in the church office.

January 29: *“Christian Nationalism: What is it and Why Now?,”* presented by David Engen. Christian Nationalism is front and center in the political turmoil which seems to define our national conversation today. David Engen will present the ideologies at the center of this political movement and how it runs counter to what defines the Christian faith. We will look at it considering scripture, Luther, and contemporary writers – those supporting it and those in opposition.



January Neighborhood Ministries Partner of the Month: *Our Saviour's Community Services*

Our Saviour's Community Services, a non-profit founded by our sister congregation, operates a shelter for adults experiencing homelessness, transitional housing for women who have experienced domestic abuse, and permanent supportive housing for men and women who live with a mental illness, physical disability, and/or substance use disorders.
