Accent on Worship Cantor David Cherwien

What do you "GET" to do?

Often when at Saturday evening social gatherings, I am asked: Do you have to be at church in the morning?" I gleefully respond: "Yes, but I don't 'have' to be there, I 'get' to be there." This is not some clever "this is how everyone should think" response, it's truly how I feel. Church is actually where I want to be. I suspect our assemblies are full of people who feel the same way. Because, with the exception of the paid staff, no one "has" to be here – it is a choice. When the entrance hymn begins, I get the same rush I have felt for the past 22 years – complete awe at the robust singing. Yep, I get to be HERE, and by the sound of the singing, they feel the same way.

I marvel at the extent at which institutions, even churches, go out of their way to make attending as convenient as possible (thankfully not here at Mount Olive). I wonder if at those places the assumption is that people don't really want to be there, or their coming is simply something to endure, or a box to check off of some "really should" set of activities. Some places make the gathering as short and simple as possible so people can get to whatever it is the planners assume they would really rather be doing in the first place. The truth is: any assembly, at pretty much any church, is made up of folks who opted to be there. Starting with that assumption may be more helpful!

Ask an extremely busy person why they would agree to do something in addition to their full schedule, and the response is likely "Because it's really worth the time, and a high value activity." I've found that to be true – people actually do make the time for that which is important, no matter how full their schedule is.

Sometimes the Gospel calls us to re-evaluate to some extent what is important, to identify what we "get" to do, and maybe let go of things we feel we "have" to do. Of course, there are things we don't enjoy doing that are not really optional. I admit that I don't think to myself "I GET to clean the toilet today!" But for many of our activities, the question can be raised.

One family trudged through snow and traffic for children's choir on a particular Wednesday. I commented on how sorry I was that it was so hard for them to get here, to which they responded – "It was hard, but it's worth it for the kids – they want to be here."

So: what is on your list? What is actually worth going out of your way to be a part of? As we look to September and all that starts up again in our lives, you might find value in re-e-VALUATING where you "get" to be ...

Mandala Stone Art Class to be Held at Mount Olive This Saturday, Aug. 19, 1-3 pm

Here is a fun opportunity to tap into your creative spirit and learn the meditative art of mandala stone painting! Absolutely no painting or artistic skill or experience needed, PROMISE! You are sure to be surprised how learning just a few, easy dotting techniques will lead to gorgeous painted stones. Classes are geared for adults, though kids (generally age 10 and up) are definitely welcome.

In this class format, you will be painting the mandala pattern that you'll select from a variety of options available. Paintings will be done on a hand casted 4-inch stone included in class. Through this process, and class instruction, you will learn all the dotting basics, plus tips & tricks, and leave class with the knowledge to make various mandala stone designs on any type of stone.

Sexton Support Needed
