Accent on Worship Vicar Lauren Mildahl

This past Sunday we commemorated one of my favorite medieval mystics: St. Hildegard, Abbess of Bingen (c.1098 -1179). Despite living a monastic life, she was remarkably accomplished and influential. She composed theological works and preached (the only medieval woman permitted by the pope to do so!). She wrote botanical and medicinal works and was also a prolific composer of beautiful liturgical music. She was also a visual artist, creating thirty-five miniature illustrations to accompany and illuminate her book *Scivias* ("Know the Ways"), a record of twenty-six of her religious visions.

Hildegard experienced visions of what she called "the Shade of Living Light" all her life. She found it difficult to explain these multi-sensory spiritual experiences and she hesitated to share them. But I am so glad she did! *Scivias* has inspired and sustained so many generations of Christians. Including me! One of the visions that has stuck with me is of a woman who Hildegard explains represents the knowledge of God. She describes her this way:

"...so bright and glorious that you cannot look at her face or her garments for the splendor with which she shines. For she is terrible with the terror of the avenging lightning, and gentle with the goodness of the bright sun; ... as the sun cannot be looked at in its burning face or its beautiful clothing of rays. But she is with everyone and in everyone, and so beautiful is her secret that no person can know the sweetness with which she sustains people and spares them in inscrutable mercy."

I've never experienced a vision like Hildegard's, but my bones know the truth of this. The knowledge of God is beautiful and sweet and terrible. Experiencing God in God's fullness is lightning and gentleness. Like the sun that cannot be looked at. And yet it is in everyone and with everyone. It sustains us and spares us in mercy that is inscrutable.

And how else can we respond to this knowledge, but in the very way that Hildegard proposed in one of her letters: "Be not lax in celebrating. Be not lazy in the festive service of God. Be ablaze with enthusiasm. Let us be an alive, burning offering before the altar of God."

I have been thinking about this line as I've been learning the liturgical practices of this congregation and appreciating the great care and passion that the members bring to their worship. I can imagine this as a refrain for Mount Olive: Be not lax in celebrating! Let us continue to be ablaze with enthusiasm, church of God, every time we catch a glimpse of the Living Light! Thank you, God, for our sister Hildegard!

Update of Sexton Role and Maintenance of Our Building

The Property Committee, with Vestry approval, has selected a professional cleaning company, Q-Pro Cleaning, Inc., to provide basic cleaning services. They began doing work for Mount Olive on Friday, September 15th. The owner Lizardo Quito has been in business for over 20 years and does work for the same property management company as Andrew Andersen. We have agreed to a 90day trial with check-ins every 30 days.

Q-Pro will be providing 25 hours of cleaning services per week and will initially be scheduled on Sunday, Monday, Friday and Saturdays. This schedule may change but will always include having support on Sundays. The schedule on Sunday will NOT include opening the building or making coffee since we are going to have the Q-Pro staff person start mid-morning and be here into the afternoon to ensure that bathrooms, halls, etc. are being monitored and needs addressed.

Lizardo will be assigning one person to our account. As Q-Pro and his staff learn the building, we will be adjusting the schedule as needed.

What Does this Mean for Members?

- The volunteer bathroom and floor crew is relieved of their duties beginning this weekend.
- Ushers are still needed 30-45 minutes before services to assist with opening the building, watching entries, etc.
- Staff will continue to open/close the building. Property to support if needed.

Next Steps to support the full sexton role:

- Develop a "set up and take down" crew for special events that the staff can call on for support.
- Exploring options for snow removal.

September Neighborhood Ministry Partner of the Month: Simpson Housing

Simpson Housing is a multifaceted organization, providing an emergency shelter, single adult supportive housing, and family supportive housing across the Twin Cities metro area. They provide along with developmental and educational services for children of families in their family shelter program and "work across the metro area partnering with landlords and developers to find sustainable housing for families and individuals." In addition, Simpson operates the Adult Shelter Connect program for Hennepin County, providing a single point of contact for those seeking shelter throughout the county.

In 2020, Simpson began the process of raising funds to rebuild their shelter and office building to become the Simpson Community Shelter and Apartments. "Plans for the [new] five-story facility include two floors of permanent supportive housing (42 efficiency units), two floors of emergency shelter (70 beds), a commercial kitchen capable of serving 100 people, a 24-hour front desk, and offices and clinic space...". Earlier this year, the temporarily relocated their shelter operations to the former Zion Lutheran Church building. They are in the final phase of their fundraising campaign and groundbreaking is planned for Fall 2023.
