About our hymnody

The "Choir Handbook" provided to the Cantorei includes a section about our various practices in singing hymns. It seems appropriate to share that information with all of you in this article.

The hope, (assumption? expectation?) is that everyone sings with "full and conscious participation" borrowing a phrase from the Roman Catholics following Vatican 2, with an awareness of meaning, and with a lack of inhibition – we're all engaged together in song as one, a unique sound each time we gather.

You may have noticed that we sing all stanzas of every hymn, keeping the texts complete. It would have to be a reason better than time to not sing all stanzas. We have the time, we make the time!

There are some things we do to help that maintain a sense of vitality, hospitality, and meaningfulness for multiple stanzas. This is mostly through "alternation" – where different subgroups sing a stanza while others rest. Just as an orchestral instrument rarely plays 100% of the time, there are moments of rest which help energize the non-rest sections.

Here are some practices we've developed with our hymn singing:

1. Singing out full voice encourages others to join in! Sing without fear – remember it's for God more than anyone else.

- 2. The first and last stanzas are usually unison this is to strengthen the melody, especially to help the non-note reader who would be drawn to the melody more than harmony parts.
- 3. Rarely do we sing two stanzas in a row the same way. Some options for alternations have been: treble voices (sopranos and altos)/low voices (tenors/basses. This has to do with octaves), harmony/unison, sometimes we'll have choir, all, organ, pulpit/lectern sides, etc. sing a stanza while the others rest.
- 4. If there are no instructions (often 3 stanza hymns) the middle stanza can be sung in harmony if the harmonies are printed in the hymnal.
- 5. If a hymn is printed in *ELW* with a harmonization, those harmonies are intended to be vocal. That was not always the case with the previous hymnal, *Lutheran Book of Worship*.
- 6. When singing in canon, always be listening to where help is needed most if a part sounds weak, jump to it! The first entrance of a canon is the most vulnerable, as many want to "wait" for a next entry point.
- 7. This is true for anything always jump to whatever needs help! IF the organ drops out, step up the game to be sure the singing remains strong.
- 8. Sopranos and tenors: when strong hymns end in a low register, the last note(s) can be doubled an octave higher.
- 9. Note-readers have an important responsibility to help.
- 10. If we run out of hymns during distribution, I sometimes pick another one and begin the introduction. If you recognize it (indexes are wonderful, aren't they?) jump to it, and visually communicate that to those around you.

I have wondered if these things could happen spontaneously. There was a time at Mount Olive when that was the case, although consistent patterns were observed (Stanza 2 by choir, for excample), but for clarity's sake, and for hospitality's sake, these alternations are clearly identified in the service folder.

I hope you will consider joining me and other Mount Olive sisters, brothers, and siblings for a joy-filled engagement with the Feminine Divine during the 2023-24 education year. We are finalizing readings and our schedule at an inaugural meeting Thursday, October 5, at 5:30 pm, in the lower level lounge at Mount Olive.

I am deeply grateful to the members of the "Year A" Feminine Divine 2022-23 group, who significantly enriched my experience of this community, and my life! Others asked if they could join or if I was offering it again in the future, so we will see if there is enough interest for Year B. Please join us as you are interested and moved by the Spirit! You no more need Year A to participate in Year B than you do for the lectionary.

This year, Year B, we will consider and contemplate the Feminine Divine as She manifests as Woman Wisdom in the Hebrew Scripture / Old Testament, as Shekinah (the Spirit of God that dwells within), and ChristoSophia from the tradition's roots, alongside the Christian mystics. We will likely use three or so texts; scholarships are available. 

Upcoming Adult Forums

October 1 and 8: "Climate Change and Jesus' Three Temptations: Energy in human history as viewed through the lens of Matthew 4:1-11," presented by Professor Frederic L. Quivik, retired professor of history at Michigan Tech, and presently serving as part of the Saint Paul Area Synod Care of Creation.

October 15: As is done every year, the vestry will present the Mount Olive budget proposal for the coming year. This will give you the opportunity to learn more regarding the financial needs in order to fulfill our mission.

October 22 and 29: The Rev. Dr. William Russell will present a 2-part series on the historical and theological impact of The Smalcald Articles. September Neighborhood Ministry Partner of the Month: Simpson Housing

Simpson Housing is a multifaceted organization, providing an emergency shelter, single adult supportive housing, and family supportive housing across the Twin Cities metro area. They provide along with developmental and educational services for children of families in their family shelter program and "work across the metro area partnering with landlords and developers to find sustainable housing for families and individuals." In addition, Simpson operates the Adult Shelter Connect program for Hennepin County, providing a single point of contact for those seeking shelter throughout the county.

In 2020, Simpson began the process of raising funds to rebuild their shelter and office building to become the Simpson Community Shelter and Apartments. "Plans for the [new] five-story facility include two floors of permanent supportive housing (42 efficiency units), two floors of emergency shelter (70 beds), a commercial kitchen capable of serving 100 people, a 24-hour front desk, and offices and clinic space...". Earlier this year, the temporarily relocated their shelter operations to the former Zion Lutheran Church building. They are in the final phase of their fundraising campaign and groundbreaking is planned for Fall 2023.
