## Accent on Worship Vicar Lauren Mildahl

Last spring, I took a wonderful class at Luther called "Ancient Erotics," which was primarily a deep dive into the the book of Philippians, which turns out to be full of allusions to Ancient Greek erotic love poetry! That may seem strange, but it was actually really powerful to read the letter through that lens because it brings out a new and powerful dimension of Christ's love for us. You can't ever think about the Christ Hymn in Chapter 2 the same way again once you learn how "emptying himself" is a reference to Christ's guts literally melting away because of the overwhelming love and passion he felt for us!

That class has been often on my mind as we've been on a whirlwind trip through Philippians over the last few weeks in the lectionary. Since this Sunday will be our last week in the letter, I'd like to take some time to nerd out a little bit about my favorite epistle. To that end, I want to draw your attention not only to the erotic references, but to the two women Paul addresses in chapter four: Euodia and Syntyche.

This is their only appearance in the New Testament and we know precious little about them. And, unfortunately, the majority of commentators have been quick to paint them with a negative brush. Since Paul urges them to "be of the same mind in the Lord," centuries of (male) interpreters have assumed that they must have been in the middle of some dispute. Basically something along the lines of, "Oh, you know women, always bickering – that must have been the problem."

But the professor of my class (David Fredrickson) convinced me that this has been a very unfair misreading. Not only do ancient Greek epistles often encourage people to do what they have in fact been doing, but Paul uses a remarkable verb to describe these two co-laborers: *sunathleo*. This is usually translated as "struggle together" or "work together with," but those translations miss the metaphor. You may notice that the "athleo" part of that verb looks a lot like our word athlete. No coincidence! This was a word used to describe participating in athletic competitions, which were strictly male at the time. The fact that Paul used this word to describe these women might have been jarring to his readers and shows the deep respect he had for them and the faith he had in their ministry prowess.

Euodia and Syntyche have had a bad reputation for a long time, but I hope you might hear their names this week with fresh ears and be inspired by their faithfulness and work for the gospel. And I will end by recommending Dr. Fredrickson's book Eros and The Christ: Longing and Envy in Paul's Christology if you want to learn more!

## **Upcoming Adult Forums**

**October 15:** As is done every year, the vestry will present the Mount Olive budget proposal for the coming year. This will give you the opportunity to learn more regarding the financial needs in order to fulfill our mission.

**October 22 and 29:** The Rev. Dr. William Russell will present a 2-part series on the historical and theological impact of The Smalcald Articles. The Smalcald Articles or Schmalkald Articles, are a summary of Lutheran doctrine, written by Martin Luther in 1537 for a meeting of the Schmalkaldic League in preparation for an intended ecumenical Council of the Church. Dr. Russell has focused his study on the importance of this document in the formation of Lutheran theology.
