## Accent on Worship Cantor David Cherwien

#### "The Liturgy"

Throw those two words into a conversation, and it's possible two people conversing would be talking about two different things. For some, "the liturgy" is a prescribed pattern (by a mythical "they") that is faithfully observed on Sundays and other occasions. For others, the words "the liturgy" might refer to the songs of the ordinary (Kyrie, Glory to God, Holy, Holy, Holy, Lamb of God, etc.). While both are probably correct, there is much more. I thought it helpful to explain how we planners approach the comment to help clarify conversations about the liturgy.

Many of us were taught that the word "Liturgy" itself means "work of the people." So, in essence, the definition would be "that which we gather to do." In a generic way, there are four main components can be expanded and contracted through optional inclusions: Entrance, Word, Meal, Sending. Each of these four can be shaped in a variety of ways. Sending, which happens quickly at the end of the liturgy, is actually the longest as it stretches from the time we leave the Nave and continues until we grab our coats to return for the next liturgy. The sending is not only sending us away from the church after a service, it is sending the Gospel into the world through our lives – the work of the people goes on.

Rather than "the liturgy" being one prescribed and complete map of activities, "The Liturgy" is actually a set of puzzle pieces (among many options) custom fit for a once-in-a-lifetime assembly of people of God. Options help illuminate and/or deepen the observance of a liturgical season -- most of which *Continued on page 2*

adjust the opening part, the "Entrance." Options help in facilitating the fullest and conscious participation of those we anticipate will assemble, hopefully including that which represents who they are, creating a unified body, not representing a particular individual within.

The ELW includes ten "settings" of Holy Communion. Textually, they are very close to identical, but what varies is the musical canticles/songs. The intent in offering that many settings is not that all congregations learn all ten and rotate. They represent a variety of expressions/styles – the oldest being Gregorian Chant (setting 5), the two primary traditional settings from the previous hymnal (settings 3, 4), an American folk setting (setting 2 by Marty Haugen), African/American Gospel (setting 6) a LatinX setting (setting 7), newly commissioned settings for this book (settings 1 and 9), and a setting with melodies derived from known hymns (setting 10) perhaps for communities with limited musical resources. The hope is that planners pick one or a few of these settings which best match the assembling community and use mainly just those – often. This helps to provide for the best expression and with repeated use they can become very familiar. It is also possible to "assemble" a setting using songs from resources other than the 10 settings of ELW, as is the case for our summer Eucharists.

In addition, each individual setting is full of "may rubrics" (an activity which "may" be included -or not), and options for which of the songs are sung. We pick one setting for a season, and currently have been using "setting one" for ordinary time since September and will continue to do so until Advent. While setting one takes up 20 pages (pp 94-114), our current liturgies are made up of about 5 of those pages. The one portion that is always used is the Great Thanksgiving through the Sanctus and Eucharistic Prayer. Right now, that is the extent of our use of the setting, with the exception of the Gospel Acclamation "Alleluia" which is melodically related to the Sanctus.

So when the phrase "The Liturgy" is used, I would probably ask "Which one?" because they all are different. Different puzzle pieces that fit together are assembled to create a whole, but each week, each season, quite different yet also consistent.

The goal, always, is to help facilitate a meaningful, balanced flow that engages, edifies, and perhaps even prods a little.

So. What are your thoughts?

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#### **Upcoming Adult Forums**

**October 22 and 29:** The Rev. Dr. William Russell will present a 2-part series on the historical and theological impact of The Smalcald Articles. The Smalcald Articles or Schmalkald Articles, are a summary of Lutheran doctrine, written by Martin Luther in 1537 for a meeting of the Schmalkaldic League in preparation for an intended ecumenical Council of the Church. Dr. Russell has focused his study on the importance of this document in the formation of Lutheran theology.
