Accent on Worship Vicar Lauren Mildahl

We will hear this week a rare reading from the prophet Zephaniah, who offers a similarly rare directive: "Be *silent* before God!" (1:7). It isn't often that the Biblical writers encourage us to be silent. More often, in the Psalms especially, we are encouraged to "Sing!" and to "Shout!" Even Zephaniah, just a few chapters later, will say instead: "Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem!" (3:14).

But this week, we are invited into silence.

In this case, it is a fearful, ashamed silence in the face of the punishment that Zephaniah warns that God has in store. But that isn't the only way to sit silently before God. We can also sit with God in friendly, comfortable silence. Or in reverent, obedient silence. Or in expectant, eager silence. Or in calm, peaceful silence. Silence is nuanced, multifaceted, and strangely intimate.

Silence, as a spiritual practice, fascinates me, although I am not very good at it. One of the first things I do in the morning is push play on a podcast to listen to as I brush my teeth. There's always something playing while I drive, when I go for walks, when I do the dishes. I even fall asleep with noise! I don't leave very much room in my life for silence.

But I wonder if I'd be better off if I did. Christian communities throughout time have developed many different spiritual practices of silence. Many monastic communities observe "The Great Silence" between evening and morning prayers. Quaker communities engage in worship that is centered in silence, so that the Friends might be more receptive to divine revelation. Even the ELW directs that we observe "silence for reflection" following

the sermon at every Eucharist. Again and again Christians have searched for God, and found God, in silence.

Silence is opportunity. An opportunity to reflect, to search our hearts. An opportunity to listen, to hear God's still, small voice. Yet so often we squander that opportunity. Are we afraid of the hurts or hates we will discover lurking in our hearts? Or are afraid of what we might hear the Spirit saying something hard or harsh? We might hear those things in silence, but what messages of love and joy and peace are we missing when we drown out God's voice with noise? I suppose we'll have to follow Zephaniah's advice and brave the silence to find out.

Peace of Mind

In working with our Afghan friends, we are often reminded of things we take for granted, like peace of mind that comes from knowing we are safe and have a home. Things that they think about all the time and cannot take for granted.

- When they first came to our community, LSS applied for Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for the father, but we have since learned that this does not protect the mother and the children born in Afghanistan from being sent back. So they worry.
- When their immigrant parole status was about to expire in July and they were in danger of being sent back to Afghanistan and persecution, the Biden administration extended their parole status for two years, but again this is temporary. So they worry.
- When our congress failed (again) to pass the Afghan Adjustment Act, and the Afghan Ally Protection Act, the "easier" pathway to a more permanent legal immigration status and citizenship was blocked. So they worry.

Working with an Afghan immigration attorney, himself an immigrant, we have learned that a petition for asylum, once granted, would protect the whole family's immigration status and move them closer to being eligible for a green card and citizenship and remove much of the worry associated with their current, temporary status. But it is costly for them to do this since LSS is no longer able to help them.

The law firm's reduced rate to immigrants for this application is \$5,000, \$1,500 of which would be required to retain their services and begin the application process. The family can make payments each month until the remainder is paid off. Your Global Missions Committee feels this only transfers the worry and does not really add peace of mind. So we would like to open this opportunity to the generous hearts of Mount Olive to help provide funding support for the asylum process and the peace of mind it would bring. Any additional funds received would be used for dental work (a root canal and crown) required for the father.

Gifts, as you are moved and able, should be clearly designated for "Afghan resettlement" on the memo line. Thank you doesn't begin to convey the gratitude they already feel for our community's support.

Summary of the Monthly Mount Olive Vestry* Meeting - Oct. 9, 2023

This summary is part of a 6-month trial of putting monthly Vestry meeting summaries in *The Olive Branch*, so members of the congregation can be informed about what the Vestry is discussing and working on.

In Progress Business

- We discussed the September 16 Vestry Retreat, and some action plans that President, Chandler Molbert will formalize.
- The Vestry approved Jim Bargmann's proposal that we add Mount Olive's name to the list of
 organizations supporting the "Our Future Starts at Home." This coalition of organizations
 supports a constitutional amendment dedicating a consistent funding stream for affordable
 housing.

New Business

- The Columbarium Committee is working on starting Phase 2 of the Columbarium.
- The Vestry approved the proposed budget for 2024, which is slightly less than last year's budget.
- We planned for the Congregational meeting which took place on October 29.
