# Accent on Worship

Recently, a seminary friend of mine told me how shocked she was when a professor at Luther began a class by listing off which books of the Bible he thought were "just plain evil." And while I agree that hearing the Holy Scriptures described as "evil" would also upset me, the truth is, I can kind of get where he was coming from. Especially when I think about how often some specific scripture passages have been put to evil uses in my life and in the lives of those I love.

For me, the Second Reading this week is one of those passages.

Now, I don't hate all of it. In the first verse Paul writes to the Corinthians: "All things are permitted for me, but not all things are beneficial..." (1 Cor 6:12a), which is kind of a perfect "law and gospel" verse. It begins with a succinct encapsulation of the gospel, the freedom we have in Christ: there are no requirements -nothing we must do to earn salvation, nothing we must not do for fear of losing God's love -- all things are permitted! And it ends with a gentle reminder of the law, that this freedom is not a freedom from consequences. "Not all things are beneficial" is just a fact, a plain admission that our actions have consequences sometimes very negative ones. And that if we choose to take advantage of our neighbors, to look out only for ourselves, to chase worldly pleasures, sooner or later we will have to live with the fallout: brokenness, isolation, bitterness, and suffering. Or, as it has often been put, we will be punished not so much for our sins, but by our sins. "All things are permitted for me, but not all things are beneficial." I like that part.

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But, I find reading the rest of the passage pretty traumatic. Because then Paul goes on for quite a long time, strongly urging the Corinthians to "shun sexual immorality," (which, in this case, seems primarily to mean to stop sleeping with prostitutes) and concludes by reminding them that their bodies are temples and that they must use them to glorify God.

This might not seem like a particularly harmful idea. But, for me, growing up in the South in the height of the Purity Culture Movement in non-denominational churches, Paul's admonitions against sexual immorality loomed large. They were weaponized, forceful and inescapable, especially for girls. It was widely understood in the tradition I grew up in that sexual sins were THE WORST SINS, and at the time I probably would have said that it was easier for God to forgive murderers than it was for God to forgive those who have sex outside of marriage. It was drilled into me through the language of scripture passages like these and through books like *I Kissed Dating Goodbye* and fads like wearing promise or purity rings.

This passage was never really framed for me as being about gospel at all, or about the intersection of freedom and consequences. It might as well not have started with "all things are permitted," because all I heard was law. And I was scared. I was scared of degrading my temple. I was scared of my own body, of my own sexuality, of the men I might 'tempt,' and of the rejection I might experience from God or my church if I slipped. And it's hard not to call that evil.

So what do we do with the parts of the Bible we just don't like? For me, this story does end in redemption. It ends, after deconstruction and reconstruction, in freedom and in Christ. As an adult, I am still discovering the life that is possible in Christ, in the Word-Made-Flesh, rather than the words on the page. Still discovering with quivering possibility that everything is permitted in the abundant life of Christ! It doesn't mean I'm free of scars. My journey is not over, not with God and not with God as revealed in these ancient writings we revere as Scripture. But now I can see the Bible as one more place for redemption, one more chance to experience the love of God that overcomes even our own descriptions of it. That overcomes evil with good.

# Genre-jumping Trumpet & Organ Recital at Mount Olive

Mount Olive Music & Fine Arts presents American Nomad and The Modern Hymn Project

The magnificent Schlicker pipe organ at Mount Olive will get a different kind of workout on Sunday, January 28 at **4:00 pm.** Instead of a classical concert, Mount Olive will host two outstanding Minnesota musicians to present American Nomad and The Modern Hymn Project. Mount Olive Cantor David Cherwien teams up with acclaimed Minnesota Orchestra trumpeter Charles Lazarus for an evening of exciting and virtuosic music making. At the center of the genre-jumping performance will be the performance of American Nomad, a classical/jazz hybrid concerto for trumpet written by Emmy Award-winning composer, Steve Heitzeg. The program will include selections from Lazarus's latest recording of modern takes on hymns and spirituals along with classical favorites.

Juilliard-trained Charles Lazarus is a respected orchestral soloist, composer and bandleader.



"There are very few classical trumpet concertos that incorporate jazz improvisation as an integral part of the work," said Lazarus. "American Nomad melds cool jazz and a contemporary cinematic flair. I hear it as a hipster's coast to coast journey that captures elements of many American musical styles."

Organist, composer, conductor and clinician, David Cherwien is delighted to be artistically stretched. "In addition to piano improvisation, I am doing a couple of organ pieces: In Dir ist Freude, by Bach, and my own "Prelude and Toccata on 'Of the Father's Love Begotten," said Cherwien. "We have been having much fun preparing this program - it's quite different and probably the most diverse program I've ever participated in!"
