## Accent on Worship Jim Bargmann

There seems an interesting through-line in this week's appointed readings. This certainly isn't always the case where all four readings connect, and I cannot speak to whether it was intentional or not.

In the reading from Jonah, we know that Nineveh was considered a "great city." That very phrase is used by God themselves every time Nineveh is mentioned in their conversations with Jonah. And yet, because there were "more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who do not know their right hand from their left," they were doomed to destruction.

In Psalm 62:9, the Psalmist writes, "Those of low estate are but a breath; those of high estate are a delusion." Given context, I don't know that the Psalmist was writing as much about the individual person themselves as much as they were writing about the concept of status - that whether you had a high standing or a low standing in the community, that simply doesn't matter.

In the reading from 1 Corinthians, we are given a list of things where we are instructed to live as though those things do not actually exist and told, "For the present form of this world is passing away."

And finally in Mark, we hear the story of Simon, Andrew, James, and John, all fishermen, who are called by Jesus to give up their livelihood and join in God's work. And they do just that, seemingly immediately and without hesitation.

There seems a message of the unimportance, the insignificance of greatness, status, possessions, even income, being communicated by all four of our readings this week. In a very real sense, I think all four revisit a theme common in our readings just before and though Advent - the reality of living within God's reign is different than the reality we often experience in our everyday lives. But if we are serious about believing that God's reign is a reality now and not simply a someday, what do we do with this?

I wish I had an answer for you. But at the same time, perhaps it really is better that way. Perhaps we each need to figure that out for ourselves, guided by prayer and the Holy Spirit.

I know personally, I long for a day when life will not seemingly be ruled by a necessity of money. I long for a day when status and power are not dependent on how wealthy a person is or is not. I long for a day when all have homes and food and clothing and all they need for life. I long for a day when no one has to say, "I wish I could do this, but I need to do this because it pays the bills." It is this longing that motivates me to do what I do - attempting to create a society where these things are true and not just a far off hypothetical.

What about you? What part of the reality of God's reign do you find yourself longing for? And how can we, as fellow journeyers in this faith community, join you in making that a reality in the here and now? At least until God's reign is fully realized.

# Genre-jumping Trumpet & Organ Recital at Mount Olive

Mount Olive Music & Fine Arts presents American Nomad and The Modern Hymn Project

The magnificent Schlicker pipe organ at Mount Olive will get a different kind of workout on Sunday, January 28 at **4:00 pm.** Instead of a classical concert, Mount Olive will host two outstanding Minnesota musicians to present American Nomad and The Modern Hymn Project. Mount Olive Cantor David Cherwien teams up with acclaimed Minnesota Orchestra trumpeter Charles Lazarus for an evening of exciting and virtuosic music making. At the center of the genre-jumping performance will be the performance of American Nomad, a classical/jazz hybrid concerto for trumpet written by Emmy Award-winning composer, Steve Heitzeg. The program will include selections from Lazarus's latest recording of modern takes on hymns and spirituals along with classical favorites.

Juilliard-trained Charles Lazarus is a respected orchestral soloist, composer and bandleader.



"There are very few classical trumpet concertos that incorporate jazz improvisation as an integral part of the work," said Lazarus. "American Nomad melds cool jazz and a contemporary cinematic flair. I hear it as a hipster's coast to coast journey that captures elements of many American musical styles."

Organist, composer, conductor and clinician, David Cherwien is delighted to be artistically stretched. "In addition to piano improvisation, I am doing a couple of organ pieces: "In Dir ist Freude, by Bach, and my own Prelude and Toccata on "Of the Father's Love Begotten," said Cherwien. "We have been having much fun preparing this program - it's quite different and probably the most diverse program I've ever participated in!"

LSM offers opportunities for musicians of all kinds: brass, winds, strings, percussion, piano, organ, voice, harp, guitar, handbells, and more! Students receive advanced musical instruction through large ensembles (festival choir, band,



and orchestra), chamber music, private lessons with collegiate-level faculty, and elective classes.

In the evenings, students attend recitals, Evening Prayer services, and social events with their friends. LSM 2024 takes place at Valparaiso University in Indiana from June 30 - July 28 (full session) or June 30 - July 14 (half session) and is open to students who have completed grades 8 - 12.
