In the Gospel reading for this upcoming Sunday, we hear a very short recounting of Jesus' being driven into the wilderness where he was tested by Satan. Matthew and Luke both record much more detail about Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness and much has been written about the specifics and nature of Satan's testing of Jesus. What stands out to me in my reading of these verses is not the testing itself but what Jesus does following the wilderness experience. All three accounts tell us Jesus then went to Galilee to share the good news about the closeness and reality of God's reign. I do not think it too much of a stretch to say that Jesus' experience with testing informed his ministry. Following experiences that offered Jesus wealth, power, and glory, he went on to share God's love with people who had no wealth, very little power, and certainly not glory or status. Jesus' deep, personal experiences with being offered these things gave him the ability to minister to those who likely faced daily longing for those very same things. And he could offer an alternative. A better way. The way of God.

Daily, I continue to explore how my experiences shape how I minister alongside others. I think it no coincidence that I care deeply for those who struggle to afford housing. I have been there in my life. And so God leads me, within a community of people who share the same desire, to work to eradicate the worry about having a place to live from the lives of those I meet.

I have experienced the brokenness of divorce. Daily I meet people struggling with the effects of family brokenness. I have known what it feels like to struggle with knowing where I fit, feeling alone even when surrounded by people. And I find myself able to offer a sympathetic ear when someone, with tears on their cheeks, shares how very alone they feel much of the time.

Have you found this to be true in your life as well? Do you find that the very experiences you have had or continue to have are the very ways you connect to others? Perhaps this is part of the way of God's reign. That the Spirit of God in her wisdom brings healing to our lives so that we have the opportunity not to simply bring healing in some generic way, but that we have the opportunity to bring healing in some very specific ways. Those areas in which we have struggled give us the beautiful opportunity to make God's love a reality in the lives of others who share the same struggles. I pray for God's continued healing for me - and for you. And that we would continue to be presented with ways we can be vessels of God's healing for others.

Looking for Soup Makers

Receiving Ashes on Ash Wednesday – a change

There are two times a year where we kneel at the altar rail: Ash Wednesday, when we receive ashes on our foreheads; and Maundy Thursday, when we receive absolution individually.

The Worship Committee has been concerned about the challenges for some of our people to climb those stairs each time, and has decided to move the kneeling to the bottom step for both of these liturgies. (A similar move was done last year with the washing of feet on Maundy Thursday.) There will be acolytes to help any who need it, and the kneeling cushions will be across that first step. The hope is that this will enable more to participate, and also remove anxiety about navigating those steps for some. As always, those who do not kneel for health reasons will still have the choice not to kneel here.

Lenten Pilgrimage

The Stations of the Cross are a long-standing Christian tradition in the West. Dating from the thirteenth century and promulgated by Franciscans, this devotional practice emerged as a way of visiting the sacred sites of Christ's Passion when travel to the Holy Land wasn't possible. Here at Mount Olive, we've celebrated a Stations of the Cross liturgy at noon on Good Friday for many years.

This year, visual representations of our nine stations will accompany us in the nave throughout Lent. They come from different artists of varying backgrounds and eras representing the richness of Christian thought and practice. Embracing our assembly, these pieces wrap us in the mystery of our salvation. They call us to the wonder of Christ's passion and to solidarity with all victims of violence and oppression.
