In the presence of God. Being the presence of God. Four years ago, in February of 2020, we had no idea what was about to unfold. After two short weeks into March, the world had pretty much shut down. What was routine, what we knew, what we wanted to do with the freedom to do it, even our sense of safe being all out the window. Now four years later, we have gone back to our routines, doing what we want if we are able, back to little things bothering us again. (Isn't it amazing how times of crises remind us that little things are just that: little?)

I've wondered from time to time: Lent is offered as a time to renew; to decide what is truly important, and what is little. Putting the season simplistically, we're working on what our souls need for a change into new life in the Resurrected Christ. What does that new life look like? How different is it from before we ventured into Lent? Imagine if the impact of this yearly exercise were to have the same dramatic effect as having gone through pandemic. How we were so happy to be able to get out of our homes, be with other people, to be able to gather in person and sing together again. Can we experience this kind of dramatic change as full of joy when we arrive at the Vigil of Easter and offer the Easter proclamation? The power of the Easter Vigil liturgy is most impactful if we've spent 5 weeks working towards it.

Lent is a time that is offered for you to enter into as much as you decide to. It's not just additional disciplines, forcing ourselves to feel bad, or blue. Lent is not a plea for God to intensify God's presence but a plea for each of us to renew; reconnect with our awareness of God's presence in a transformational way.

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Lent can be for anyone who wants to step fully in – a package. That package began with Ash Wednesday, and its flow carries us all the way to Pentecost Sunday – which this year falls on May 19. The more one enters into that flow with all its pieces, the more potential impact the transformation can carry. What we need and ultimately choose for entering this package can be at varying levels of what that looks like.

I compare it to studying the Bach B-minor Mass. It can be enough to simply listen to it. The music is amazing, and indescribably deep even if we don't know why. But there are many layers to discover by looking closer. How Bach embodies this set of texts in ingenious ways, the symbolism – at the macro and micro level. Musicologists have an endless supply of material with which to do their research and peel these layers of the onion for a long time as they earn their doctorates. After doing their research they usually are driven to do more, and there is more to discover – all increasing the intensity of their listening experience. But for many, merely listening is enough.

So, back to Lent – this portion of the package. Lent is available to you to step into at whatever level or layer you need. But consider this invitation to step into the deep waters of Lent. The water is fine.

ELCA Lenten Study Available Online

The ELCA's initiative, Sumud: For Justice in Palestine and Israel, presents "Following the Way of Jesus: A Lenten Holy Land Journey." Samud is the new name for the ELCA Peace Not Walls campaign. Sumud is an Arabic word meaning "steadfastness."

This Lenten video series for individuals and congregations consists of six short videos that introduce people to the land, the theology of sumud and its significance through Scripture as the "way of Jesus." The videos will post on Facebook (ELCA Sumud), Instagram (@elcasumud) and webpage (elca.org/sumud) every Monday, so you can share from there if it is easier for you. There is also a guide that goes along with the videos. It includes discussion questions and the scripture for the week.

A Reflection from Our Taste of Palestine and Israel

Our education hour was a thoughtful, respectful, and moving experience. Our speakers, Ashraf Ashkar and Sam Rahamim had never met before they accepted our invitation. The three of us met three times before Sunday, twice in person, once on Zoom, for a total of over four hours. What a gift from these men. At first it seemed like a combined forum would be impossible. Each man has spoken to groups numerous times, and each suggested that perhaps two separate education hours were in order. That was not our vision. After agreeing that both would speak from their personal perspective rather than any organization, that questions would




be agreed upon ahead of time, that questions would not be taken from the floor, that the stance would be one of listening, sharing and learning, and that we would not record/post the conversation we were able to move forward.

Both told their stories of historical and personal pain and displacement. Both helped us understand more about this present moment. (Here is where I believe I personally learned the most.) Both spoke frankly about their hopes/fears for the future. Of course, we didn't get through all of the questions, but more is being shared here.




At the meal our committee took the stance of looking for and praying for hope, of sharing a meal from both cultures, and of learning more about our global ministry partners around the globe and specifically in Palestine and Israel--Bright Stars of Bethlehem (Dar al-Kalima University) and Lutheran World Federation (Augusta Victoria Hospital). We showed a short video from Bright Stars of Bethlehem. While these organizations are in our Global Ministry budget, you may add your own donation by using your blue envelope and marking it for a specific partner.

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We acknowledged the pain and prayed for peace. We will continue to work for that, to learn all that we can, to refuse any stance which does not acknowledge all of God's children. As Ashraf, Sami, and I agreed at our first meeting, if we cannot agree that no one wants their children killed, we have nothing to talk about. But if we can agree, then we can work together to find new paths, to stay out of the way when it is not our place, and to urgently support those who seek a lasting peace.

Ashraf and Sami were asked to share one book which they would recommend our members read to better understand Palestine and Israel. Below are their recommendations along with a short review of each. Both books (a single copy of each) will be available from the Mount Olive Library.

Ashraf's recommendation: *The Other Side of the Wall: A Palestinian Christian Narrative of Lament and Hope,* by Munther Isaac "In this remarkable book, Munther Isaac takes us behind that wall and offers us a glimpse into things that are generally kept from view. He tells a story that is as compelling as it is heart wrenching, a story that every Christian needs to understand to grasp one seemingly endless conflict in the Middle East."

Lenten Pilgrimage

The Stations of the Cross are a long-standing Christian tradition in the West. Dating from the thirteenth century and promulgated by Franciscans, this devotional practice emerged as a way of visiting the sacred sites of Christ's Passion when travel to the Holy Land wasn't possible. Here at Mount Olive, we've celebrated a Stations of the Cross liturgy at noon on Good Friday for many years.

This year, visual representations of our nine stations will accompany us in the nave throughout Lent. They come from different artists of varying backgrounds and eras representing the richness of Christian thought and practice. Embracing our assembly, these pieces wrap us in the mystery of our salvation. They call us to the wonder of Christ's passion and to solidarity with all victims of violence and oppression.

When you have a moment, you might take this art in — one piece at a time or by walking the Way of the Cross in prayer, the Way that leads through Death to Life.
