In the presence of God.

Being the presence of God.

Our First Reading for this Sunday contains a great spiritual truth for sure, but also a great lesson in the psychology of humans. A physical action or gift on its own very rarely results in change. It is the relationship, perhaps along with a physical gift, that motivates change.

We see this truth lived out in social services day in and day out. A gift of food, clothing, bus cards, birth certificates, or even things as significant as a vehicle or a new home often don't on their own help a person heal and grow. The consequences and scars of systemic racism, abuse, neglect, addiction, or any number of other psychological wounds may appear to have gone, but too often, they rear their ugly heads again and old patterns of behavior are repeated. But a gift of food, clothing, economic supports, a car, a home, accompanied by relationships in a community of caring others often provides the strength needed to pursue those higher goals - working on the damages of abuse, neglect, addiction.

Permit me to interrupt myself briefly. I want to be very clear that I am not drawing any kind of line between those with financial needs and those without in terms of the all-important work of psychological healing. We all have our stuff - we all have wounds and scars - and work to do, regardless of economic status, and the truths here apply to all of us.

Interruption done. Jeremiah teaches that these things are true of us spiritually too. A significant physical act by God, the freeing of slaves from Egypt, did not result in lasting relational change between God and their people. Not to say God made a mistake in taking the action they did.

But God did continue to act, and Jeremiah prophesies that one day, God's own people will all know God's love and forgiveness because, "I will be their God, and they shall be my people." That's relationship language. In this language, I hear the echo of Revelation 21 where we hear the beautiful language describing the day when God's reign will be fully realized. But I would argue that the reality described by God through Jeremiah is true now too. Of course, as our other reading from this week teaches, the work of forgiveness was accomplished by Jesus' death and resurrection. But the language of knowing - that's Spirit language to me. The Holy Spirit helps us to know the seemingly unknowable - to know God themselves and to live in relationship with God. And it is in that relationship that we can fully live into the blessings of forgiveness, love, acceptance, and yes, growth, brought about by that very same God.

Upcoming Adult Forums


March 17: "Life, Legacy, Love, Death"

Rest eternal grant them . . .

The Mount Olive Columbarium, which was established in 2007, has a new section which is now being installed. The first unit has 96 niches, and 75% of them are accounted for, so the Columbarium Committee started plans for this second phase. The new unit (construction pictured below) holds another 80 niches. There are also plans for a third phase, if needed in the future, that will be kept on file. The columbarium itself is built by the Eickhof company, and the woodwork is done by RK Wolfgang (formerly St. Paul Fabricating.) Eickhof's work is completed; the woodwork should be



installed sometime in April, after which we will bless the new unit for its use.



Many thanks to the Mount Olive Foundation for the loan to get this second phase built. Some of the costs were covered by the Columbarium fund, created by the sale of niches. But as with the first unit, the Foundation offered the Vestry a loan, this time of up to \$40,000 (final costs aren't yet available), to complete the project. The first loan was paid off by the cost of niches, and the same will happen with this second loan. If you're interested in reserving a place for burial in the columbarium, there are brochures and forms in the rack by the north entrance to the narthex, or you can contact Carol Peterson, the chair of the committee, or the church office.

Getting to Know the Mount Olive Community

In-district meeting with local representatives on the topic of housing

In partnership with Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, Mount Olive is hosting a meeting with two of the elected representatives from District 62, Representative Aisha Gomez and Representative Hodan Hassan.

At this meeting, we will celebrate the passage of the Minnesota rental voucher program called Bring It Home, MN at the same time as we advocate for the passage of the proposed Constitutional Amendment for Housing which will fully fund Bring It Home, MN and several other vitally important housing initiatives. In addition, we plan to talk about the importance of funding supportive housing, both in terms of funds needed for building supportive housing, but also funding for the on-going services provided as a part of these facilities.

While this meeting specifically gives those constituents who live in District 62 a chance to meet with their representatives, anyone is welcome to attend. However, Beacon is holding a number of these events in a variety of districts. March Neighborhood Ministries Partner of the Month:

Sabathani Community Center and Community Emergency Services

In March, we highlight two of our partners that work on issues of food insecurity in our south Minneapolis community as a part of the Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign, a state-wide initiative intended to bring together "organizations, businesses, faith communities, and individuals" to raise awareness about the issue of food insecurity and support for local food programs.

"Sabathani Community Center is one of Minnesota's oldest African American-founded nonprofits... [and] helps equip approximately 32,000 South Minneapolis residents annually" through their food shelf, clothes closet, senior's programs, workforce initiatives, support for school- age children, and more.



Community Emergency Service or CES, works to alleviate hunger and food insecurity through an on-site food shelf, food delivery programs, a partnership with Meals on Wheels, and its unique Ani-Meals program, providing food for pets and service animals.

Mount Olive has chosen to support each of our Partners of the Month through a yearly contribution from our budget. On top of those financial contributions, we encourage any member who wishes to donate over and above our budgeted amount to those partners doing work in their areas of passion and concern. You can do this using your offering envelopes or our online giving system. All additional contributions to our partner of the month will be distributed to the partner for the month in which the contribution is received.

In addition, we will be collecting donations of non-perishable food items in the cart located in the West Assembly to be divided between our two food shelf partners. However, for those who are able, we strongly encourage monetary donations. Because our food shelf partners have access discounts and bulk purchase opportunities not available to regular consumers, monetary donations allow our partners to purchase much more food than if we were to purchase the same food through a retail store.
