He is risen! Alleluia and thanks be to God!

We made it, friends! As much as I love Lent, it's time for Easter. We have been to the wilderness, drenched in the Spirit of God, and emerged on the other side of the cross and the tomb. Mourning, repentance and discipline – we aren't done with those, but it's time for a dance break in the sun.

And we'll dance in the Easter Season, not to our usual readings from the Hebrew Bible, but instead to the music of the book of Acts. For the next seven Sundays, we'll soak up the stories of our spiritual ancestors, living into the new creation with beloved community, bold proclamation, and the unstoppable Holy Spirit. I invite you to listen!

Listen to how the first believers lived in community: gathering for meals, feeding those in need, having all things in common, welcoming all people in friendship. Friendship was serious business in the ancient world. And in Christ, friendship is abundant, filling the pages of Acts as a sign of the reign of God drawing near.

Listen for the dynamic boldness of the sermons and proclamations made by these early believers, most of whom were poor and uneducated. But through the Holy Spirit they speak like professional orators and articulate persuasively their world-shaking witness of Christ's life, death and resurrection. Their boldness is infectious and hopeful and reminds us how good the good news really is.

Listen for the unstoppable Holy Spirit, who wings her way through all the stories in Acts. There is something inevitable about the stories in this book, something that can't be stopped – even to the last word of the book, "akōlytōs," which means "without hindrance." Despite tale after tale of hindrances, of martyrs and prisons and arguments and problems, there is something about life and love in the Spirit that persists, that breaks through every barrier, that can't lose.

Adult Forums

April 7: "The Wisdom of Awe," presented by David Engen. The University of California - Berkeley has embarked on the study of awe as a critically important experience for humanity. We need experiences which take us out of ourselves and place us at the center of mystery. They go so far as to say the survival of the species depends on the experience of awe. Religion sometimes can focus only on the rational part of human thinking. But what about the aspects of wonder, mystery, and unexplainable? Have we become so rigid in our thinking we refuse to recognize there are some things beyond our comprehension? Is there a way for us to recapture the childlike wonder we once held? How does being open to awe transform our vision, our lives, and strengthens our relationship with God?

April 14: "Demystifying the Work of People of Faith in the Political Process" Coordinator of Neighborhood Ministry Jim Bargmann will lead us through a conversation about how we as people of faith can engage in the political process from grass-roots community organizing though the actual passage of a bill in the Legislature. The conversation will include thoughts about the actual process itself, along with an examination of the ethical and legal issues around communities of faith engaging in politics at all.

Note: This forum will be intentionally paired with an exciting "Part 2." For those interested in further dialog and training around community organizing and advocacy work, please plan to stay after the 10:45 am liturgy that day when Katie Dillon, Executive Director for Align Minneapolis will teach us more about what it means to work for societal change though the political process. Lunch will be provided.

Please note that either of these events will be appropriate for anyone over the age of 12. Young people, even before they reach voting age, can engage in this work in a powerful way and would be welcome and encouraged to attend.
