Accent on Worship Jim Bargmann

While I realize there is no rule about what we are to write in this space, I think it appropriate to warn you that I am about to take a detour from my normal pattern of writing some thoughts about our Scripture readings for the upcoming Sunday.

The phrase "lex orandi, lex credendi" has been circulating in my brain for a few weeks

now. I thought it may be worth it to work through those thoughts, put them in some kind of coherent order, and share them with you.

I first became aware of this phrase in college in one of our classes on worship and liturgy. The phrase and the concepts behind it were originally written down by the 5th century writer Prosper of Aquitaine. How's that for an obscure church leader reference?

But the history of this phrase is not what makes it important and certainly not what has been in my brain. This Latin phrase literally translated means "the law of praying, the law of believing."

As it was taught to me, the concepts here are not linear but they play off of one another in a kind of circular fashion. How we pray, worship, and practice our liturgy informs what and how we believe - and by extension, how we live out our faith. And what and how we believe affects our prayer, our worship, and our liturgy.

There are many places this concept can be applied - our music, our choices of language, the order of our worship, the connections to the historical practices of the church - all things we hold dear at Mount Olive and all of which inform what and how we believe.

But there is one particular action, commonplace in our liturgical practice, that brought this phrase to mind. It is how we reverence. While a symbolic action for sure, our reverencing affects how we see our God, how we see ourselves, and how we see one another and vice versa. *continued on page* 2

At the beginning and end of each liturgy, and sometimes at other points too, it is a powerful thing to watch nearly every head turn to face the cross and bow. We physically put ourselves in a posture of humility before our God. And this is no small thing. I believe this physical act, repeated over and over again, shapes our belief about our God. There is honor there. There is humility. There is a willingness to learn and grow and be shaped by that very God. Lex orandi, lex credendi.

But this is not the only time we reverence. Those of us who serve in the Chancel area will often reverence toward one another when handing off a physical object used in our worship to another not only as a recognition of the holiness of the object, but the holiness of the person before us. But I see you, dear friends, lowering your heads to one another too. It happens in the hallways, in the kitchen, in our office spaces, but most notably, when we share God's peace with one another. A little bow of the head when reaching out for a handshake, a wave, or a hug. And here too, we recognize the Imago Dei in each other. We honor one another with the motion, but that motion both informs and shapes our belief in the intrinsic value of the other. Lex orandi, lex credendi.

Let us continue to allow our prayer, our worship, our liturgy, to shape how we believe and our belief to shape our prayer, our worship, our liturgy. Lex orandi, lex credendi. Because it is a beautiful thing.

Theological Discussion Group Resumes November 2

Mount Olive's Theological Discussion Group disbanded around the time of the Covid pandemic. It will resume on Sunday, Nov. 2, in the Library after the second liturgy.

We will read chapters 1-5 of *All Things Flee Thee for Thou Fleest Me,*" by The Rev. Emmanuel Charles McCarthy, a priest of the Eastern Rite (Byzantine) Melkite Catholic Church. Formerly a U.S. Marine pilot, lawyer, and university educator, McCarthy is the founder and the original director of The Program for the Study and Practice of Nonviolent Conflict Resolution at the University of Notre Dame. He is also founder of Pax Christi USA.

Several decades ago, McCarthy presented a conference on Christian nonviolence at Lutheran Social Service for clergy and church workers while simultaneously leading a retreat at RC St. Paul seminary. He has conducted retreats and conferences throughout the world and was nominated for the Nobel Prize for his life's work for genuine peace.

The book is available through Amazon in paperback for a little over \$15. We will read the first five chapters. Contact Al Bostelmann of you are unable to purchase the book.

Counters Needed

Calling all Introverts - Counters needed!

The Stewardship team is growing! We are looking for several members to join in the service of counting our weekly offerings. It is fun, simple, and is a scheduled commitment every three or four weeks. Counters work in teams of 3, at a time that works either after Sunday eucharist or another time early in the week at night or afternoons. You don't have to be an introvert at all, but comfort using an adding machine and detail orientation is helpful.

Roles:

Lead Counter (2 needed): comfortable entering values into an Excel spreadsheet template and e-mailing a report at the end of the counting session. Scans checks through our new check-reading machine to ensure the deposit is made immediately.

Counters (3 needed): conducting a manual tally of cash and checks, using an adding machine. Time commitment – 60-90 minutes per counting session, every 3-4 weeks.


Training for these positions will be provided. A computer is provided, the counting takes place in the counter's/Treasurer's office on the lower level.




