Accent on Worship Cantor Daniel Schwandt

The gospel reading for All Saints this year is the familiar passage of blessings and woes: "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God...but woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation." The Beatitudes from Matthew's gospel are different in Luke's account; the familiar blessings juxtaposed with parallel "woes." It is the conclusion of Sunday's gospel that has me wondering:

"Love your enemies; do good to those who hate you; bless those who curse you; pray for those who mistreat you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also, and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who asks of you, and if anyone takes away what is yours, do not ask for it back again. Do to others as you would have them do to you." (Luke 6.27-31)

The so-called "golden rule" which was drilled into us in our youth bears frequent repeating in these fraught times. But what does this laundry list of life instructions have to do with saints?

Our beloved dead who sing with us on the other side of the veil were sinners just like us, and just like us, failed at doing to others as they'd have done to them. Some, quite probably, in spectacularly awful fashion. These words of Jesus ring like convictions of the Law, not necessarily Good News. At best they seem a sort of non sequitur in relationship to our remembering the saints.

Perhaps it is a reminder for us, the living, that the reign of God encompasses all these very real and sometimes mysterious complexities. Life is full of blessing and woe, full of times for being peacemakers and a time for unwillingly participating in systems of oppression. Life also encompasses feelings of deep sorrow for loved ones lost, and for those—if we're honest—we acknowledge are free from the burden of being themselves. We pause, light a candle, say a word of thanks for the bonds of love and the promise of eternal life, and the get about the work of being the baptized saints on this side of heaven: loving God by serving our neighbor, and loving those as we wish to be loved. Let us rejoice, give thanks, and sing.

Harm Reduction and the Use of Narcan Wednesday, November 12, 12:00 to 1:30 pm Mount Olive Lutheran Church

Every two months, our partner Align Minneapolis, hosts an educational event for volunteers serving in the ministries of their 19 congregations.

Next month, Mount Olive will host this event and together, we will have a chance to learn about harm reduction and the use of Narcan (sometimes also called Naloxone) in the case of suspected overdose. This has been a frequently-requested topic among the volunteers at many Align congregations, including Mount Olive.

Anyone interested in learning these vital skills is welcome to attend - regardless of whether you actively volunteer within our Neighborhood Ministry programs or not.

There is no cost for this event - it is paid for by Align Minneapolis - but donations to cover honoraria for the trainers can be accepted.

Upcoming Adult Forums

- Nov. 2 & 9 "Women and Divine Calling in Hebrew Scriptures," a 2-part series presented by Earl Schwartz. In this series we explore biblical texts in which a woman is referred to as a prophet, a wise woman, and/or a judge-chieftain. These passages suggest broader cultural horizons among ancient Israelites than is often assumed, while presenting many questions, including: Do these inspired and inspiring women represent a moral voice and vision associated primarily with women? If so, how might we understand this quality in light of other gender-related aspects of evolving Israelite culture, and our own?
- Nov. 16 "Lutheran Campus Ministry at the University of Minnesota," presented by Vicar Erik Nelson. Dr. Mark Granquist jokingly refers to the University of Minnesota as the largest Lutheran university in the United States. But what does Lutheran Campus Ministry at the University of Minnesota actually look like? Join Vicar Nelson as he shares his experiences with LCM, as well as some of the opportunities and challenges that LCM faces. Vicar Nelson previously served LCM for three years as their Saint Paul Campus Outreach Intern.

Theological Discussion Group Resumes This Sunday

Mount Olive's Theological Discussion Group disbanded around the time of the Covid pandemic. It will resume on Sunday, Nov. 2, in the Library after the second liturgy.

We will read chapters 1-5 of *All Things Flee Thee for Thou Fleest Me,*" by The Rev. Emmanuel Charles McCarthy, a priest of the Eastern Rite (Byzantine) Melkite Catholic Church. Formerly a U.S. Marine pilot, lawyer, and university educator, McCarthy is the founder and the original director of The Program for the Study and Practice of Nonviolent Conflict Resolution at the University of Notre Dame. He is also founder of Pax Christi USA.

Several decades ago, McCarthy presented a conference on Christian nonviolence at Lutheran Social Service for clergy and church workers while simultaneously leading a retreat at RC St. Paul seminary. He has conducted retreats and conferences throughout the world and was nominated for the Nobel Prize for his life's work for genuine peace.

Shared Ministry Notes

At the semi-annual meeting of the congregation a few days ago, Pr. Crippen mentioned that most people at Mount Olive do not "pledge" or promise to share a dollar amount with the congregation each year. He's correct. For the current year, (2025), forty-four households filled out a pledge card. That equates to about 25% of the total number of households in the congregation. Mount Olive has not mounted a vigorous pledge drive in recent years, and there is debate among religious circles about whether this practice is effective in helping a congregation meet its budget.

For some people, pledging is an important process that gives voice to their promise of support of our ministries. For others, it seems like a needless or unreasonable exercise. What do you think? If you'd like to share your thoughts about pledging, you can
