Each of us has a different relationship with time. Some of us are early birds, while others are night owls. Some of us are chronically late (surely not I, Lord!) while others understand that arriving early is the only way to be on time. Some feel anxious about the future, while others simply live in the moment, responding to each day's challenges as they come.

Even without clocks, we perceive time in our bodies. We sense the waning daylight. We feel the growing chill against our cheeks. We hear the crunch of leaves under our feet. We know what time it is by what the earth tells us.

St. Paul announces to us this Sunday that we, too, "know what time it is" in the chronology of our salvation. God's reign is nearer to us today than it was yesterday. Don't be distracted by foolish or sinful things, he writes; Christ is coming because he has already come and comes among us still.

The church knows well this Advent time. We embody it every year. The candlelight grows. We gather closer together to feel the warmth of community. We sing and hear the familiar songs of hope and expectation as we await God breaking into our time: in the past, in the future, and at every liturgy. Through bread and wine, water and oil, God breaks into our time and makes visible the promises of grace and mercy that are beyond time. We know what time it is. It is time to hold fast to the promises of God and the future God has in store for us.

Reflections from Palestine: Incarnational Presence

One of the reasons a religious experience is life-changing is the degree to which it is truly incarnational, meaning that the spiritual takes human form and marches before us, providing an opportunity to respond or to be changed. From November 3-12, 18 members of Mount Olive and I were given the gift of experiencing the presence of God in so many ways that it had the potential to be overwhelming, difficult to fully appreciate, and difficult to absorb.

And from the first day, the incarnational presence of God came in human form, talking to the people of Palestine. Our first day included a visit to Dar al-Kalima, a Palestinian university supported by the Lutheran church and Bright Stars of Bethlehem. We met Christ in the faces of three young students who maintained hope despite so many challenges. Despite the images of destruction on the West Bank and Gaza, which the media presents almost exclusively, these three adhered to a common theme. All believed there would not be change or peace without them. The future is in their hands, and all three were



committed to making a difference. They represented different faith foundations, but none saw this as a reason for division; rather, they saw it as a reason for hope.

I wondered if I could remain as hopeful as they were. They looked forward. Achmed dreamed of being a musician and proved the point by bringing his guitar to our gathering and playing a piece by Metallica, though in the form of a ballad. The women who joined us would be fashion designers. None of these dreams was questioned. They would be what they had set out to be. War, division, and racism would not stop them.



God's spirit of hope is alive in them and others who are focused on healing and service in a place the world has often labeled hopeless. God's Spirit was encouraged in all of us who were privileged to speak to them that day.

Shared Ministry Reflections: Pledging

(Traditionally, Pledge Campaigns happen in the fall. However, since Mount Olive doesn't base its annual budget on the results of a pledge drive, the Shared Ministry committee has decided that we will ask the congregation to make pledges of financial resources early in 2026. This column will offer occasional reflections by those who pledge on why this practice is important to them. This week's comments are submitted anonymously.)

For me, my pledge is an extension and visible reminder of the commitment I make to my God and community in response to their grace and goodness. For the past several months our liturgies included the rite for affirming our baptism before the prayers of the church. Each recitation of those words was a reminder of God's love and grace to us and a renewal of the evils we renounce daily and the beliefs in the triune God we hold dear. Those were good reminders for me, and I heard the same from others around me.

In today's world of many distractions and uncertainty, making and keeping commitments can be challenging at best, and fear-inducing at its worst. But we believe in a gracious and loving God and I want to honor that. I know God does not need my pledge (though it helps my faith community gauge what they can expect as they plan for ministry to me and my neighbor) and that God will continue to love me and be ever-faithful whether I pledge or not, and whether I fulfill my commitment or not. I continue to pledge, though, because I need it. Each time I make an entry in my check registry (even though I now give electronically) it is a tangible reminder of the promises I made to God and this community in my baptism – to profess my faith in Jesus Christ, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church. It is physical evidence of my commitment to support my brothers and sisters and pray for them in their life in Christ. It is a thank-offering for God's promised gifts through water and the Holy Spirit – new birth, cleansing from sin, and eternal life. Pledging ensures I don't get distracted by the cares and chaos of the world and forget these promises (at least for very long). I know my nature. Without making a commitment, the noise of the world and my sinful flesh could easily erode my intentions or relegate them to what is convenient instead of keeping them constantly before me. And each year when it is time to renew that commitment, it is an opportunity to re-evaluate both my and the church's needs and make adjustments as I am able.
