Accent on Worship Vicar Erik Nelson

This week, our church's calendar commemorates Søren Aabye Kierkegaard, a Danish theologian, philosopher, and social critic. He died 170 years ago, on November 11, 1855. Though his life was short (only 42 years!), he was extremely prolific in his writings. One could spend a lifetime studying his ideas and philosophy.

One aspect of his philosophy that is

particularly interesting to me is the way that he viewed the modes of human existence in three categories: aesthetic, ethical, and religious. He believed it was natural to ascend from one to the next. He taught that humanity was freed from self-interest when they devoted themselves to ethical life, and by submitting to the divine, they can attain spiritual maturity. Though the aim is to move from one to the next, they are not in opposition. The mature person carries the best of each category with them. When one grows in ethical clarity, that doesn't mean they throw out the beauty and delight that comes with an aesthetic life. When one grows in spiritual maturity, they can't throw away the ethical framework that got them there. This leads a person to see their whole life as a unified and harmonious masterpiece, always growing in beauty and complexity. This goes with Kierkegaard's belief that faith is a task for a whole lifetime.

Kierkegaard's relationship to the church is also interesting to me. I believe it gives us some insight for our time. In his last days, he spoke out aggressively against the Danish Lutheran state church, arguing against their position as an institution fully intertwined with the state. In this fusion of church and state, they lost their ability to speak as boldly and critically as Kierkegaard wanted. As we see the separation of church and state continually eroded in our country, I believe we should take up Kierkegaard's challenge. In what ways has our church bent the knee to forces of empire? How have we let our own witness be dulled by our complacency?

The ELCA is one of only a handful of churches who commemorate Kierkegaard on our calendar. We have a unique opportunity to think about him this week and consider how his witness might reshape our witness.

At the semi-annual meeting of the congregation a few days ago, Pr. Crippen mentioned that most people at Mount Olive do not "pledge" or promise to share a dollar amount with the congregation each year. He's correct. For the current year, (2025), forty-four households filled out a pledge card. That equates to about 25% of the total number of households in the congregation. Mount Olive has not mounted a vigorous pledge drive in recent years, and there is debate among religious circles about whether this practice is effective in helping a congregation meet its budget.
