So you may have life in Christ's name

In John's Gospel, the Evangelist gives the reader richly fleshed out stories, characters with depth and complexity, and in all of them John asks us: can you see Jesus as these people did? We've been having these encounters all Lent: Nicodemus (Lent 2), the woman at the well (Lent 3), the man born blind (Lent 4), and now this week we meet and walk with the siblings from Bethany facing the reality of death.

John's hope seems clear from his words in chapter 20:30-31: "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may continue to trust that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through trusting you may have life in his name."

"These are written," these stories told, these people introduced to you and me, in the hope that you and I might come to trust in Jesus as God's Christ and find life in Jesus' name. When you imagine yourself as Nicodemus, or Photine (the traditional name of the Samaritan woman), or the blind man, or the Bethany family, by looking at Jesus through their eyes, or even the eyes of others in the stories, what do you see? Who do you come to trust Jesus really is? Might you come to find the life that all of these people eventually find, the abundant life in God's love Jesus came to give?

That's John's hope. Come, see for yourself, and find this life, too.

Tuesday Noon Bible Study Link


The Tuesday Noon Bible Study meets weekly in person in the East Assembly Room. For those who are unable to come in person, the Bible Study is held over Zoom as well.

March Neighborhood Ministries Partner of the Month: *Sabathani Community Center and Community Emergency Services*

In March, we highlight two of our partners that work on issues of food insecurity in our south Minneapolis community as a part of the Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign, a state-wide initiative intended to bring together "organizations, businesses, faith communities, and individuals" to raise awareness about the issue of food insecurity and support for local food programs.

"Sabathani Community Center is one of Minnesota's oldest African American-founded nonprofits... [and] helps equip approximately 32,000 South Minneapolis residents annually" through their food shelf, clothes closet, seniors' programs, workforce initiatives, support for school-age children, and more.

Community Emergency Service, or CES, works to alleviate hunger and food insecurity through an on-site food shelf, food delivery programs, a partnership with Meals on Wheels, and its unique Ani-Meals program, providing food for pets and service animals.

Mount Olive has chosen to support each of our Partners of the Month through a yearly contribution from our budget. On top of those financial contributions, we encourage any member who wishes to donate over and above our budgeted amount to those partners doing work in their areas of passion and concern. You can do this using your offering envelopes or our online giving system. All additional contributions to our partner of the month will be distributed to the partner for the month in which the contribution is received.

In addition, we will be collecting donations of non-perishable food items in the cart located in the West Assembly to be divided between our two food shelf partners. However, for those who are able, we strongly encourage monetary donations. Because our food shelf partners have access discounts and bulk purchase opportunities not available to regular consumers, monetary donations allow our partners to purchase much more food than if we were to purchase the same food through a retail store.

Why do we pledge to Mount Olive?

Throughout our lives, we have both been involved with several churches, and while each congregation had unique characteristics that made it stand out, Mount Olive has inspired us unlike any of the others. Most importantly for us, Mount Olive acts. Throughout the congregation, we see active ministries working in our church community and the greater community surrounding us. We see people welcomed enthusiastically, and who feel they belong. We see people helped with the most basic of needs. We hear the gospel preached with fervor. We are steeped in grace through the music and worship unique to our congregation. We hear the message of God's unconditional love in both the obvious and the subtle. In this environment, financial support feels more like an opportunity than a requirement, as we can see how these funds are put to good use.

And though we understand the importance of financial contributions, sharing our time and abilities has also led to a stronger relationship with the congregation. After the COVID period ended, and we realized how much we had missed the community aspect of Mount Olive during lockdown, we made a conscious decision to find ways to get more involved beyond attending services and congregational meetings. While the congregation shares a singular focus on serving Christ, we have found that this involvement may look quite different for different people. Some have musical talents to share, or wish to serve during worship services, while others prefer helping with tasks behind the scenes, or working with children and families. All these activities can lead to stronger relationships with others in the congregation, which then adds a new level of depth and richness to the worship services.

At the risk of sounding cliché, we receive far more than we give to the ministries of Mount Olive. And we can see how members and visitors who find themselves in our congregation's embrace also benefit from Mount Olive's devotion to serving Christ by serving others, each of us in our own way.

Calling all Knitters and Crocheters!

If you like to knit or crochet, Mount Olive has an invitation for you! We've had a prayer shawl ministry for a long time, but we have a need for knitted or crocheted blankets/afghans. At the end of April, four kids and one adult will be baptized during the morning liturgy. We'd like to present all of them with a blanket to remind them of God's love for them.

The children's blankets should be a minimum of 36 x 48 inches, and hopefully even a bit larger. The adult blanket should be about 54 x 110. The children and the adult are all male. The people who know them recommend a mixture of darker colors.

Major Faith Action Event on March 29

On the Sunday of the Passion (Palm Sunday), March 29, 2026, Christians across the country will gather together in a “Christian public action and worship rooted in our gospel-centered values: caring for the sick, feeding the hungry, welcoming the stranger, and loving all of our neighbors. Together, we will renounce abusive power, cruelty and greed and proclaim a better way.” (Quote is from the organizers.) Locally our action will be at the State Capitol Mall.

This Palm Sunday Faith Action in the Twin Cities is the flagship action of 25 other similar events planned across 14 states (palmssunday2026.com). From the organizers again, here is the emphasis of this worship and action event: “We will push back against authoritarianism and white Christian nationalism. Our democracy is at stake. For ourselves and the dignity of our neighbors, we are standing up and speaking out.”

This event is led by our Black Christian siblings in our community and will be musically led by the Black Church Power Project congregations. The time together at the Capitol will include diverse and dynamic speakers from across denominations, Scripture, prayer, music, and children's activities.

A procession to the Capitol is planned, starting at three different churches, at 1:30 p.m., with the main event on the Mall scheduled for 2:30-4:30 p.m. All are encouraged to bring palms from the morning, and signs if you wish (but there are instructions about making them appropriate for a Christian faith action). If you wish to meet at the Capitol at 2:30 instead of processing, that's fine, too.

It would be wonderful to have a large Mount Olive contingent present. As an incentive, our siblings to the north, Our Saviour's, are trying for 100% of the congregation coming - a worthy goal!

The organizers would like to have anyone attending register. There are links to that and other social media suggestions, along with full information about the timeline, where to gather for procession, what kinds of signs are encouraged, and so on, in the TWIG sent out next week, or you can also link to it through the national website.

Church Offering Envelopes Update
